SENATE WANTS TO KNOW WHERE AUTHORITY RESTS

Implied Doubt of Right of the
President to Exempt
Railroads

Washington, Jan. 8.--By a viva
voce vote the senate today adopted
Culberson's resolution instructing
the committee in judiciary to report
to the senate whether the president
was authorized to permit the ab-
sorption of the Tennessee Coal &
Iron Co. by the United States Steel
corporation.

Washington, Jan. 7.--President
Roosevelt has handed the senate in-
formation on the Secret Service which
is "one of the hottest potatoes" that
have yet come from the White House.

One feature of the letter leads di-
rectly to Senator Tillman, whom the
President does not like. The Sen-
ator said there could be no develop-
ments which he would desire to have
kept from the public.

The President's refusal to let At-
torney-General Bonaparte tell the
senate why the steel trust was not
prosecuted for the purchase of the
Tennessee Coal & Iron company has
stirred up the senators. Senator Cul-
berson has introduced a resolution
calling upon the judiciary committee
to say whether the President had the
right to permit the deal to be put
through. Other steps may follow.

The house committee tomorrow
will recommend that the Secret Ser-
vice paragraph in the first message
be laid on the table and that all
personal references in the second
message be similarly treated. All of
the members personally attacked by
the President will make speeches.

communication from any
which is not in its own judi-
ciousness, and be it further
Resolved, That the special
committee and the committee
whole House on the state of the
Union, be discharged from any

annual message as relates to the
Secret Service and is above and
beyond that the said portion of
the message be laid on the table.

37 BIRTHS AND 20 DEATHS DURING DECEMBER

County Health Officer J. W.
Harris Makes His Report
For Last Month

County Health Officer J. W. Harris
has made out his report for Decem-
ber. According to his figures there
were 37 births in the county during
the month of December--29 females
and 17 males. There were 20 deaths
--10 females and 10 males. The
causes of death were as follows:

Old age, 2; typhoid fever, burned,
unknown, brain fever, gallstones, ap-
oplexy, bronchitis, bladder trouble,
acute toxic meningitis, suicide, urae-
mic poisoning, operation for appen-
dicitis, pneumonia, cancer of stom-
ach, valvular heart disease, acciden-
tal gunshot wound, cerebral hemor-
rhage, no cause assigned, one each.
There were 11 cases of contagious
diseases--2 of measles and 9 of
smallpox.
