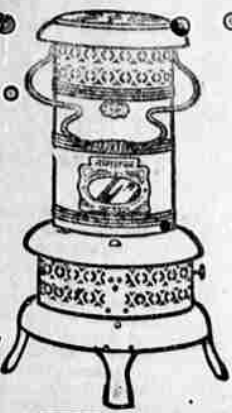

GENERAL NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Jan. 9.—The
presidential electors will meet Mon-
day in the capitol of the various
states to cast their ballots for president
and vice president, and to choose
messengers to carry the votes to
Washington, where the official count
will take place in February before
the two houses of congress assembled
in joint session.

President-elect Taft will spend Fri-
day and Saturday in Atlanta, where
elaborate arrangements are being
made for his reception and entertain-
ment.

The ships of the Atlantic fleet,
homeward bound on their cruise
around the world, will scatter dur-
ing the week for brief visits at Na-
ples, Genoa, Algiers, Athens and other
Mediterranean ports.

The case of Patrick Calhoun, presi-
dent of the state railway company of
San Francisco, who is charged
with bribery of public officials, is set
for trial Monday.

The committee appointed by Gov-
ernor Hughes of New York, to in-
quire into the business and meth-
ods of Wall Street, will meet Monday
to take up the investigation of the
affairs of the New York Produce
Exchange and New York Cotton Ex-
change.

The Cuban congress will convene
Wednesday to scrutinize the vote in
the recent presidential election. The
regular sessions will not begin until
after the inauguration of President
Gomez on January 28.

The whole question of the senten-
cing for contempt of court of Messrs.
Gompers, Morrison and Mitchell of
the American Federation of Labor
will be thrashed out at a meeting
of the executive council of the federa-
tion, beginning in this city Mon-
day.

Surgeon-general R. M. O'Reilly,
who has been at the head of the med-
ical department of the army since
1902, will be retired for age Thurs-
day and will be succeeded by Colonel
George W. Torney, now in charge
of the general hospital at San Fran-
cisco.

The social event of the week will
be the wedding of Miss Beatrice
Mills and the Earl of Granard, which
will take place Thursday at the New
York home of the bride's parents.

During the week sessions of the
legislature will begin in Wisconsin,
Texas, South Carolina, Iowa, Colo-
rado, Kansas, Oregon, Utah, Wash-
ington, West Virginia, Wyoming and
Washington.

Governors and other state officials
chosen in November will take office
in Ohio, North Carolina, Kansas,
Washington, Missouri, Indiana, Colo-
rado, New Hampshire and Illinois.

PHONE SUIT WILL GO TO U. S. SUPREME COURT

Salom, Or., Jan. 8.—A case in-
volving the constitutionality of the
initiative and referendum, besides
several thousands of dollars in taxes
due the state from the Pacific States
Telephone & Telegraph company,
was argued in the supreme court to-
day. The points involved have al-
ready been passed upon by the su-
preme court of this state but it is in-
tended by the corporation to carry
the case to the United States su-
preme court for final settlement.

The points involved arose over the
refusal of the telephone trust to pay
the 2 per cent gross earnings tax
imposed by an act adopted by the
people at the polls in June, 1906,
under the provisions of the initiative
amendment to the constitution. Suit
was brought by the state to compel
the payment of this tax, which has
precipitated the present litigation
that will take the initiative and re-
ferendum for the first time before
the United States supreme court.
