HOBBS SAYS EUGENE WOMEN ARE DRUNKARDS

Revenue Collector Tells Medford Paper of Alleged Conditions Here

(Medford Tribune.)

"In spite of the statement made that business has improved in Eugene since local option went into effect I can state that such is not the case, also the statement that there are no blind pigs is almost too ridiculous to pay any attention to."

That was the statement made by J. W. Hobbs, the internal revenue collector who makes his home and headquarters in Eugene.

"The fact is," continued Mr. Hobbs, "the amount of liquor sold and otherwise disposed of there would surprise any one if the figures were given out. The great trouble is that most of it is now kept in homes instead of in the saloons as formerly. The result is that many women have become drunkards on that account who otherwise would probably not have thought of taking a drink."

"The wholesale liquor houses send out free books of instructions as to how to make fancy drinks, and now every afternoon many of them gather together and have 'booze parties.' I have seen many women drunk in Eugene since prohibition went into effect, but I never saw that condition of affairs before."

"Formerly places in Eugene where liquor was disposed of had United States licenses, and a large number were issued. The local authorities, however, watched these places with the result that now there is not a single United States license in Eugene. Before it was out of our hands, but now we are compelled to look after the interests of the government, and now it is our affair entirely, and local authorities are not sorry. A few days ago we arrested five men for 'boot-legging' and there are dozens more of them engaged in the business there all the time. In fact, the last session of the court could not handle all the cases for illegal selling of liquor and another session had to be called in order to dispose of them."

DIED

At the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Mark T. Fleming, in Eugene, Saturday evening, January 9, 1909, Robert Pattison, aged 80 years, 11 months and 26 days. The cause of death was a general breaking down due to the infirmities of old age. He was one of the oldest of Lane county's pioneers. He was born in Randolph county, Illinois, January 2, 1828. He came to Oregon by ox team, crossing the plains in 1849. He spent one winter at Oregon City and in 1850 entered the Columbia into what is now the state of Washington, where he lived until 1858, and then came to Lane county and settled on Camp Creek. In July, 1859, he married Isabella Eakin, who still survives him. To them were born five children: William, George, John, Margaret and Isabel, all of whom excepting George are still living. He removed from his home on Camp Creek to his late home west of Eugene in 1882 and continued to reside there ever since.

Mr. Pattison was a member of the Presbyterian church and for years was foremost in the affairs of the Central church of this city.
