OREGON DAY PROGRAM TO BE RENDERED

Fiftieth Anniversary of Admission of State Into Union on February 14th

A suggested program for public schools and literary societies for Oregon day, February 14, the 50th anniversary of the admission of Oregon into the Union. The act admitting Oregon was passed February 12th and signed by the president February 14, 1859. Inasmuch as the 14th falls on Sunday this year, it is suggested that the exercises be held on Friday, February 12th, and that the centenary of Lincoln's birth be commemorated in the same exercises.

This program is suggested by the University of Oregon and was prepared by the departments of history and education.

Recitation, "Campfires of the Pioneers," (5th and 6th stanzas); "Pilgrims of the Plain," Joaquin Miller (3d stanza); both in Quarterly Oregon Historical Society, December, 1909.

Reading, Act for the Admission of Oregon (from Report of the Secretary of State of Oregon, 1897-98, pp. 151-2).

Oration, Abraham Lincoln (by a member of the school or some prominent citizen).

Song—"America."

COTTAGE GROVE WILL TRY FOR STATE NORMAL SCHOOL

Movement On Foot to Raise Money for Purchase of Site and Buildings

The city of Cottage Grove will raise money for the purchase of suitable grounds and for the erection of buildings for the State Normal School. Located as they are at present at Drain, they are in a measure out of the way, and our natural municipal advantages and location will make it a big object for the institution to come here. Divided into districts for these places of learning, a more desirable place for a state institution could not be found than here. The advantages of a county seat, making this place the principal city between here and Roseburg, are readily seen. We are told that Drain has about 500 population, while the population of this city will run close to 3000. A bill will be drafted suitable to present to this session of the legislature, and if necessary an initiative petition will be presented to the state at the next election.

FACTS AND FIGURES ON NEW COUNTY OF NESMITH

The Cottage Grove Commercial Club committee which has in charge the matter of presenting the bill to the legislature for the formation of the new county of Nesmith, has compiled the following figures:

Total area, 1956 square miles.
Total assessed valuation, \$4,915,933.
Total population, 7984.
Total number of school children, 2810.
Total number of school districts, 42.

Assessed valuation per capita, \$617.26.
\$3,340,364 of this valuation is from the south portion of Lane county included within the boundaries of the new county.

\$1,485,569 is from the northern portion of Douglas county included within the present boundaries of the proposed new county.

The present state and county levy is 12 mills, giving the proposed new county at the same rate a revenue of \$58,991.20, 7.30 mills of this amount being county tax, or \$36,033.78, for the proposed new county.

Cost of county officers, fixed salaries:
Clerk, per annum.....\$1200
Sheriff, per annum.....1200
Treasurer, per annum.....100
County Judge, per annum.....600
Assessor, per annum.....900
School superintendent.....400

Total fixed salaries.....\$4400
Two county commissioners at \$3 per day each for actual time served.
Coroner's salary paid by fees.

The salaries of the above county officers are practically a duplicate of the Hood River county officers.

The probable cost of officers' salaries per year, including commissioner and coroner, will not exceed \$5,500.

This amount deducted from \$36,033.78 leaves a balance of \$30,533.78 for public service.
