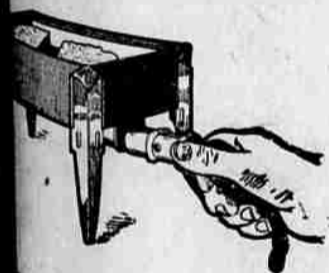

SIX TENNIS COURTS AT THE UNIVERSITY

Manager Strong Tells of Prospects for This Sport the Coming Spring

Manager Earl F. Strong says that tennis courts should be built at once, in order to have them beaten down by the March rains, and thus to be in shape in time to be played on in the good weather during April. President Campbell strongly favors the building of six courts. This number would allow a great many students who are neither fitted for track or baseball to gain healthful exercise. Said Manager Strong when seen today:

"The courts would especially be beneficial to the women of the University, who are now excluded from all outdoor sports.

"Another reason for the early completion of these tennis courts is that the team to represent us in the matches with the other colleges of the Northwest must have time and place in which to practice. The team is not chosen until just before it leaves in June, and the more contestants who try for position, the better the team will be. As the game is officially recognized by almost all of the colleges of the Northwest, it behooves us to enter into this game with the same spirit as into other branches of athletics.

"There are several good places to erect tennis courts. The piece of ground west of the grandstand and on the west side of the board walk running in the Mary Spiller House are especially well fitted on account of their good drainage. I think that the courts in these places would be played on during a greater part of the winter."—Oregon Monthly.

DEATH OF ROBERT MORRIS AT HOQUIAM

Former Eugene Man Dies Suddenly of Heart Trouble in Washington City

Further information was received yesterday of the death of Robert E. ("Scap") Morris, at his home in Hoquiam, Wash. Mr. Morris was born at Fort McDowell, Ariz., and was 39 years of age. He is survived by a widow and child and by his father, W. E. Morris, of Stanley Station.

Heart failure was the cause of his death, while walking the floor at 3 a. m. with his baby in his arms. Mr. Morris was a musician in Company A, Fourteenth Infantry, from 1886 to 1891, and after an absence of three years he re-enlisted in his old company in 1896, during which time he served in the battle of Manila, as aide to Captain Murphy, and until the year of 1899, when he was given an honorable discharge.

After leaving the Philippine Islands Mr. Morris lived at Eugene, Ore., where he became a member of the Oregon National Guard and was a member of the sharpshooters' team that represented Oregon at the National shoot at San Gil, N. J., in 1905. Funeral notice will be given later.—Oregonian.

LOREN HUNT BLAMELESS FOR KILLING GEO. KERR

The coroner's jury suspended yesterday afternoon at Cottage Grove to inquire into the death of George Kerr, murdered the following week.

"We find that the name of the deceased was George Kerr, aged 16 years and a native of Oregon. That he came to his death about 2 1/2 m. on January 13, 1909, about two miles northwest of Cottage Grove, on the crest of a ridge, of which the hands of Loren W. Hunt, that Loren W. Hunt mistook his companion, George W. Kerr, for a deer. That they were fast friends and that Loren Hunt had an intent to kill."

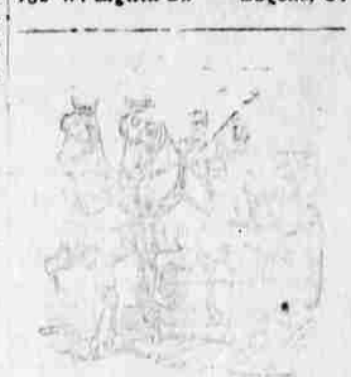
