SOME DAY WORKMEN WILL SET HOURS AND CHOOSE OCCUPATIONS

C. R. Ashby Advocates Abolishment of Dangerous and Unnecessary Trades

"Some day, not far in the future, perhaps, workmen will not only set the hours they shall work, and the wages, but will decide what the occupation shall be. Such dangerous industries as lead glazing and the making of enamel ware will not be permitted to exist," were the idealistic, but nevertheless thoughtful statements of C. R. Ashby, who lectured this morning at the University assembly on "Arts and Crafts, and the Spirit of Socialism."

This is the third trip of the distinguished lecturer to America. He says that the view point of America, particularly industrial America, is changing from the egotistic certainty that it is right, to one of doubt. "Americans are beginning to feel" he said, "that something may be wrong with their system, as the gulf between labor and the class of financiers is widening and is harder to cross."

The purpose of the Arts and Crafts movement, according to this leader, is to abolish the evils in industry, doing away with the inutilities of our lives, such things as nickel plated bathtubs or the absurd lute-knocks of the ordinary parlor. The lecturer advocated to put individuality into products of industry. He wants more than mere machine-made things. Every manufacturer, he believes, should be a moral purpose of a life.

Mr. Ashby will speak this evening at the Fortnightly Club rooms. His subject will be "William Morris."

MEDFORD STILL REMAINS FIRM FOR WET POLICY

Medford, Or., Jan. 12.—In the liveliest election ever held in this city prohibition was defeated. Both sides worked hard during the campaign, but so quietly was the matter carried on that neither side would venture this morning to make a guess as to the outcome.

Medford, by its remarkable character—giving it the right to govern its municipal affairs—which charter was sustained by the supreme court of the state, had remained the only oasis in the south part of the state. The prohibitionists firmly believed that a vote of the people would decide the matter for some time, and fully confident of the outcome in their favor they entered the campaign.

The vote was the largest in the history of the city on a city question, 926 votes being cast.

W. H. Cannon was elected mayor, John Demer, V. J. Emerick and E. A. Welch were elected councilmen. Prohibition was defeated by 127 majority and the attempt to amend the charter to make it conform with the local option law was defeated by a majority of 170.


