KERN DEFEATED. SHIVELY CHOSEN

Indianapolis, Jan. 14.—The senatorial contest was concluded when the Democratic caucus at an early hour this morning settled upon Benjamin F. Shively of South Bend, as its choice. The selection was made on the twentieth ballot. Shively will succeed James Hemenway, Republican. The chief opponent of Shively was John W. Kern, defeated Democratic candidate for the vice presidency of the United States.

Shively was a lawyer. He was born in St. Joseph county, Indiana, March 20, 1857, and graduated from the law department of Michigan University in 1884. He taught school and was engaged in newspaper work. He was elected to the forty-eighth congress to fill a vacancy, and re-elected to the fiftieth, fifty-first and fifty-second congresses. He was Democratic nominee for governor in 1896, and received the Democratic vote in the state legislature for United States senator in 1902 and 1903. He is a trustee of the University of Indiana.

BIG IMPROVEMENT IN ALBERTA PROVINCE

A dispatch in Saturday's Journal stated that "public ownership is sweeping the prairie provinces of Canada. Alberta is selling \$2,000,000 of bonds to construct a public telephone system. The premiers of three provinces are discussing a plan of public ownership of a grain elevator system. Winnipeg is to have a \$5,000,000 civic power plant." In some important respects these rapidly developing provinces of Canada are more progressive than any part of the United States, and are also in some respects, especially in the matter of the conservation of natural resources, far better governed. It is not strange under such circumstances that many ambitious, progressive people of the United States are going over into Canada. They have less politics over there.—Portland Journal.
