Washington, Jan. 18.—The Supreme court of the United States affirmed the decree of the state courts of Texas, imposing a fine of \$1,623,000 on the Standard Oil Company of St. Louis, for violating the Texas anti-trust law.

The court's decision was a victory for the state of Texas, which had brought the case against the company. The company had argued that the law was unconstitutional, but the court rejected that argument.
