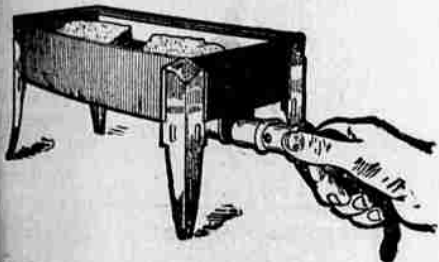

GOING AHEAD WITH TWO HOTEL PROPOSITIONS

Prominent Capitalists Interested in Dunn Enterprise—Osburn Hotel Will Be Brick

Hotel proposition after hotel proposition has been sprung on the Eugene public so often of late that little faith is had any more in any announcement of that kind of an enterprise. The Guard, though, has a straight tip that the Dunn hotel proposition on the corner of West Eighth and Olive streets is a "sure go," and that all the funds necessary for the erection of the building have been raised. The promoters of this enterprise, at which F. E. Dunn is the head, have been working very quietly in the matter, but it is known that such capitalists as Mayor J. D. Matlock, Eli Bangs and the Bonnett brothers are associated with Mr. Dunn, who is perhaps the heaviest contributor to the fund.

As has been stated before, it is the plan to erect a four or five-story brick structure on the McFarland lot and use the two upper stories of the Dunn-Wilkins block adjoining, which is now nearing completion. In the construction of the latter building a large open space in the east wall was left in order that the two buildings will be properly connected.

The Osburn proposition in this connection it might be stated is also going ahead and there are good prospects of "something doing" in the matter in a very short time. It is reliably reported that \$70,000 of the \$75,000 stock in a company for the erection of the building has been subscribed, and it is only a question of a few days until the remainder is raised. It is said that the original plans for this hotel have been changed, in that the building will be of brick instead of frame with steel lath and cement on the outside.

Pursuant to an order of the common council January 11th, 1909, bids will be received at the office of the city recorder until 7:30 p. m. January 25, 1909, for the improvement of the following streets in the city of Eugene:

Olive street, from Tenth to Eleventh.
West Eleventh street, from Olive street to Lincoln street, and
Pearl street, from Sixth street to Eleventh street.

By the construction of cement curbing along both sides of said streets and by paving said streets with bitulithic, asphalt or other hard surface pavement in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor prepared by the city engineer, and the provisions of ordinances Nos. 814, 815 and 816, all of said ordinances having been passed by the common council on the 2d day of December, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of December, 1908.

Bidders will state price in detail in accordance with specifications prepared by the city engineer and now on file in the office of the city recorder. All work to be done under the supervision of the street committee, and to be approved by them. All contractors will be required to furnish an approved bond in a sum to be agreed upon for the faithful performance of his or their contract. And all bidders shall include with each bid a certified check in a sum equal to 5 per cent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, mayor.

STAGE HORSE IS

DROWNED IN SWOLLEN SHARP'S CREEK

Stage Driver Smith Has Exciting Experience—Horses Belonged to F. J. Hard

C. M. Smith, stage driver, had the misfortune to lose one of the big horses belonging to F. J. Hard by drowning while on his regular trip with the mail last Friday into the Behemia mining district.

Owing to high water in Sharp's creek Smith did not take the stage, but packed the four big bays with express and carried the mail on the saddle with him. The trails around the fords were successfully made until this last short stretch. Instead of turning on the trail as usual the head horse plunged into the roaring stream and it seemed like all powers could not hold the others back, for the four horses are particularly attached to each other and will not be separated in pasture or in any other place.

Smith cannot tell how, but after getting a good ducking with the mail he got two of them out, one getting across, but one (the best, of course) could not overcome the current and went down stream with its pack, consisting of a quarter of beef and other goods for the Vesuvius mine. The poor animal was found dead nearly five miles below. The horse that got across stayed out until morning, then came back to find its mates.

Many Trees Fall
Another event of the trip for Smith was the falling of many trees. One nearly a foot through, while he was trying to move it, caught him, fastening one leg under it for nearly two hours, while as best he could with an axe that he had chopped away until he cut himself loose.

Ordinarily the road into Behemia is good, and each year improvements have been made for the better. Formerly there were ten fords, but new roads have been cut until now only two remain, which will probably be cut out this year.

From the red bridge, where they leave the railroad, it is about seventeen miles to the mining district through heavy forest. Wind seldom falls the trees, but with the fall of snow they became top heavy, and owing to their great height and little soil other than rocks for them to plant their roots, with a little weight on top they easily give way. Between twenty and thirty of them, varying from two to five feet in diameter, fell across the road and made travelling bad enough for one trip without casualties that attended the trip Smith made on Friday. F. J. Hard, who is superior for that road district, has put men at work and they will soon be in good condition. The snow of last week was heavy.
