maintenance contract with the Warren

committee.The recorder was ordered to draw  
a warrant for \$305.29 from the gen-  
eral fund to pay to the construction  
fund for interest.It was the sense of the council that  
stallions be required to be kept at  
the fair grounds for breeding pur-  
poses.Superintendent Taylor was author-  
ized to purchase a desk for his office.  
The milk license ordinance was  
read and referred to the city attorney  
for correction.The bill of J. A. McArthur for sur-  
veying and engineering on right-of-  
way for \$98 was presented, but was  
taken up by the water board later  
and allowed.The question of a uniform formu-  
la for cement sidewalks was discus-  
sed and referred to the city attorney  
and city surveyor.The matter of a plumbing inspec-  
tor was referred to the sewer com-  
mittee to introduce an ordinance.Various other minor matters were  
taken up and discussed and the coun-  
cil adjourned to meet at a water  
board. A number of bills were read  
and ordered paid and the board ad-

TOUCHING TRIBUTE TO  
GEO. W. KERR, JR.

Cottage Grove, Jan. 18.—Saturday,  
January 15, closed the last act of the  
final scene in the great drama of the  
life of one of Lane county's bright-  
est young men when we laid the body  
of Geo. W. Kerr, Jr., of Wildwood, to

rest in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at  
Cottage Grove.

Geo. W. Kerr, Jr., was born at Id-  
and City, Union county, Oregon, Sep-  
tember 11, 1882, and died January  
11, 1909. He was therefore 25 years  
and four months old. He was mis-  
taken for a deer while creeping  
through some brush while hunting  
with his brother Clyde and Lorne  
Hunt, who fired the fatal shot. A  
pall of sorrow and sadness has set-  
tled over the entire community and  
for some it seems to have come to  
stay. Especially is this so with  
Lorne, whose grief cannot be de-  
scribed. His is a double sorrow—be-  
roft if his life long friend and com-  
panion, and that by or through his  
mistake. Together they played in in-  
fancy and childhood, swimming in  
the same hole of water, fishing to-  
gether in the same stream. Together  
they hunted for years, and always  
without mishap or accident, and the  
bond of friendship was akin to that  
of David and Jonathan. His grief  
and heaviness of heart cannot be told  
in words.

George Kerr, as we familiarly called  
him, was of excellent character, a  
genial and sunny disposition; he  
could see something good in every  
one, and was especially kind to his  
parents, with whom he lived, always  
placing himself between his father  
and the heavier burdens of family  
care. He leaves his father and  
mother, George W. Sr., and Sarah  
E. Kerr, with six sisters and two  
brothers, who were all present at the  
funeral, which was conducted from  
the residence of his sister, Mrs. Green  
Pitcher, in Cottage Grove.

We cannot begin to describe the  
sorrow of the family. Indeed, the  
parents of both boys are almost dis-  
tracted, while one of George's sisters  
is physically prostrated. The fune-  
ral services were conducted by H.  
Barnhart, of the Baptist church of  
Donna, Or. Marvin Beach, undertak-
