HUMAN BODIES BURN IN RUINS OF EARTHQUAKE

Messina Soldiers Think Burning Flesh Is That of Living Men

Messina, Jan. 19.—A serious fire today broke out in the earthquake ruins of the wrecked city, the flames spreading in spite of the work of the soldiers to control them. The situation is serious. The odor of burning flesh in the mingled smoke causes the fear that persons still alive are being consumed. The flames had their center in Pennesi Palace, but spread over the ruins of the city.

Three Lives Lost.

Smyrna, Jan. 19.—Another short earthquake was felt this morning but no local damage was done. Reports from Phocata, twenty miles northwest, say a number of houses fell and that three were killed. The buildings were damaged in other towns. The battleships Louisiana and Virginia are at present in the harbor.
