### YONCALLA AGAINST DIVISION OF COUNTIES

Roseburg Review: B. W. Strong this morning received a letter from a leading businessman of Yoncalla, stating that the citizens there are actively opposed to the two county division schemes to be brought before the present session of the legislature.

Their opposition is not against the Cottage Grove scheme alone, but against both that and the Drain movement. They have already formulated a remonstrance there against both schemes, and it is being generally signed. Copies have also been sent to Lakton, Scottsburg, Oakland and elsewhere, requesting similar action at those places, which will doubtless be given. They also ask the support of Roseburg and the county in general, as they do not want to be cut off into a new county, with the inevitable increase of taxation which would follow.

The matter has been placed before influential people here and formal protests will probably soon be forthcoming.
