The case will come up for a hearing at that time. In the meantime conditions will remain just as they have been the last few days.

SEWERS IN EAST END IN BAD CONDITION

To the Editor:—Citizens of Eugene who wish to be convinced of our unspeakably poor sewer system need only to inspect East Twelfth, Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, between Alder and Mill streets. They will be amazed by the condition of these streets. Sewers are allowed to be congested for weeks. Inundated streets, floating sidewalks, impassable crossings, overflowing toilets and flooded basements are a common sight every winter. One justly wonders that a city of the size of Eugene should allow such conditions to exist. Much is said about the growth and prosperity of our fair city, much more about its progressiveness, but in regard to its sewer system there is perhaps no town in the valley or in the entire state that is so much behind in improvements along these lines as Eugene. It is expected newcomers to settle here and to build modern homes, something must be done to make conditions more sanitary. Matters are not improved by putting in a few miserably constructed culverts and transferring a large volume of water, often consisting of nothing but liquid manure, from one street to another, where it is allowed to stand, as it has been done on Fourteenth street. This is simply transferring damage from one place to another without regard for the citizens who happen to live a block further south or east. I thoroughly believe in boosting the city, but I believe still more in improving what we have. We probably would never have had a typhoid epidemic if the city would have insisted upon a perfect and adequate sewer system, which seems to be the most crying need of Eugene. It is up to the city council to take the situation and do its very best, irrespective of expense. Little or nothing has been done in this matter in our part of town, and what has been done lately seems more of an injury than an improvement.

Following is a statement of the expenditures of the charity fund by the Thursday Afternoon Club: Inasmuch as the date of the charity ball is set for February 6th, on which date the Thursday Afternoon Club hopes to increase its charity fund, it is fitting and proper that we should publish the amount of money expended during the past year. In this length of time ten families have been aided and in so doing a total of \$147.45 has been expended, as follows: For provisions \$44.31 For clothing 22.74 For wood 8.25 For nursing of sick and drugs 75.15 It is also of interest to add that the amount expended during the past year is almost double the amount used during the preceding year, showing that as our town increases in size there is a greater need for a charity fund.

EXTEND STREET RAILWAY LINE TO COLLEGE HILL

Subsidy Being Raised by Property Owners in That Part of City for Purpose

A subsidy is being raised by residents and property owners of College Hill for an extension of the street railway line to that section of the city. Those in charge of the work of raising the fund report good success and feel confident of raising the amount named by the railway company to insure the construction of the line.

It is planned to extend the line out Willamette street from Eleventh, running to Seventeenth. It will then extend out Seventeenth street two blocks and thence south to the crest of the hill. This is the route of the Holsten horse car line which was built in the early thirties, but which was taken up a number of years ago.

College Hill is being fast built up and it is thought the business offered from that section of the city would soon pay for the building of the extension of the car line.
