Exposition Notes.
The week of July 5, 1909, will be
Pythian week at the Alaska-Yukon-
Pacific exposition in Seattle. Dur-
ing that week all the grand lodges of
Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Brit-
ish Columbia, will convene at Seat-
tle and more than 15,000 Knights of
Pythias will participate.

The Northern Pacific railroad will
have more than 100 additional pas-
senger coaches to take care of the ex-
tra travel to Seattle next year dur-
ing the progress of the Alaska-Yukon-
Pacific exposition.

The Loyal Legion will maintain
headquarters on the grounds of the
Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition next
year.

The Japanese society of Seattle has
asked its home government to send
two warships to Seattle to remain
in the harbor during the progress of

the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition.
The Uniform Rank of the Fraternal
Brotherhood will meet in Seattle
next year and will be encamped on
the grounds of the Alaska-Yukon-
Pacific exposition.

One of the finest collections of
furs and caries ever brought out
from the north will be exhibited at
Seattle next year in the Alaska build-
ing at the 1909 exposition.

A big cinnamon bear and reindeer
have been brought out from Alaska
as part of the exhibit for Seattle's
1909 exposition.

An ancient Russian cannon has
been brought out from St. Michaels,
Alaska, for exhibition at the Alaska-
Yukon-Pacific exposition in 1909.

On the grounds of the Alaska-Yu-
kon-Pacific exposition at Seattle are
eleven miles of walks and streets.
One sixth of the paving has already
been laid.

An exhibit of Alaskan flowers at
Seattle in 1909 will demonstrate that
flowers reach a high degree of per-
fection in the Northland.

In the Hawaiian exhibit at the
Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition will
be a series of relief maps showing
the islands in their relative positions.

THREE PERSONS MEET DEATH IN RAILROAD WRECK

Altoona, Pa., Jan. 23.—In an im-
penetrable fog the second section of
the St. Louis express, westbound,
which left Philadelphia yesterday af-
ternoon, crashed into the first sec-
tion at Summer Hill, 25 miles west
of this city, early this morning, kill-
ing three persons and injuring six,
one probably fatally.
