THURSTON MAN DIES IN A NIGHTMARE

Marion Nice Expires During
Terrible Dream This Morning
--Had Been in Good Health

Marion Nice, a well-known farmer residing near Thurston, died at his home between five and six o'clock this morning during a nightmare. His wife was awakened by noise he made during his terrible dream but as these dreams were common with him she paid little attention to it. Soon he became quiet and when time for arising for the day's work came she was unable to awaken him. She soon discovered with horror that he was dead. The fright occasioned by the dream, whatever it was, was too much for his heart action and the organ gave way under the strain. Mr. Nice had been in his usual good health the day before and felt well when he went to bed.

Deceased was aged about 56 years and leaves besides his wife, two sons, Ira, on the farm, and John, who is employed in the Eugene postoffice. The funeral will be held tomorrow at 1 o'clock with interment in the Mt. Vernon cemetery.

DIMICK ANXIOUS TO BE GOVERNOR

Announces That He Has En-
tered the Race to Be
Held in 1910

Oregon City, Jan. 22.—Announcement was made yesterday afternoon by County Judge Dimick of his candidacy for governor. Although the primaries will not be held until the early fall of 1910, Judge Dimick believes that it will be of some advantage to him to make an early declaration, and so inform his friends in the state of his entrance into the race.

Grant B. Dimick is a native of Marion county, Oregon, and has been practicing law in Oregon City for the last 12 years. He was educated at the McMinnville Normal and at McMinnville College. Soon after his arrival here he was appointed deputy district attorney and afterward served four consecutive years as mayor—being elected without opposition for the fourth term. Two years ago last June he was elected Judge of Clackamas county for a four-year term. Mr. Dimick has a wide acquaintance throughout the state and believes his chances are bright for securing the nomination.

The proceeds of the Eagles' minstrels, to be given at the Eugene theatre next Thursday and Friday nights, will go to the building fund. The aerial is contemplating erecting a fine business block on its lot on Willamette street, near Fifth, some time this year.

The Spokane Athletic club five which plays Company C's team here tonight, has been playing fast games of basketball throughout Southern Oregon, and the game here will probably be the fastest that has been played in Eugene this winter. Spokane for several years has had some of the fastest teams in the whole section of Eastern Washington. This club team is supposed to be a pick of the players of that city. This is the first trip they have ever taken through this section of the country.

J. A. Krohn, of Newberryport, Mass., familiarly known as "Colonial Jack," who passed through Eugene about one month ago on his tour around the United States with a wheelbarrow, arrived in Los Angeles, Cal., yesterday. On Tuesday he covered nearly 40 miles, in spite of a sprained ankle. He left home June 1. If he completes his journey in 400 days he will win a wage of \$1,000. He pushes a wheelbarrow, which contains his wearing apparel. He has worn out six pairs of shoes and two suits of clothes. He is 29 days ahead of his schedule.

A small boy aged about 12 years was observed hanging on to a car as the southbound freight pulled out of Eugene this morning shortly after 9 o'clock. The boy evidently thought to ride from the west end of the yards down to the depot, supposing the train would stop, but it was going at such a speed when it passed the depot that it was extremely dangerous for the boy to try to get off and he no doubt hung on till Springfield Junction was reached. The practice of small boys riding on the trains in the yards should be stopped. If not, a fatal accident will have to be recorded in these columns one of these days.

RAISE FUNDS TO DEFEND MITCHELL

Indianapolis, Jan. 22.—The United Mine Workers of America today voted \$2,500 as preliminary aid for Messrs. Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison, to aid future legal proceedings in the contempt case. A resolution was also instructed by the Miners' International executive board to appropriate in the future as much as necessary to give these men proper defense. John Mitchell arrived and addressed the convention saying he had spent so much of his life building up the union that he will go to jail if necessary to advance its cause. "I will defend it as I would defend my child," he said.

At Buffalo, N. Y., Wednesday evening the Oregon basketball team of Dallas was defeated by the Germans, the champion team of the world, by the small margin of 23 to 20, after a marvelous struggle, a splendid showing for the Oregonians, after their long ride and many games nightly. This makes only four defeats and one tie, since leaving Oregon.

James A. Finch, the convicted murderer of John B. Fisher, will not have a new trial, unless it should be granted by the supreme court. FOURTH STORY WILL BE ADDED TO HOTEL SMEED

A great deal has been said lately concerning a new hotel in Eugene, also concerning the plans of S. Smeed to enlarge the Hotel Smeed building by erecting a fourth story to the building. At least one of the new hotel propositions is a certainty and possibly two, and Mr. Smeed has now announced positively that he will make the contemplated improvements to his building this year and have them completed by the first of July. Besides adding a fourth story the interior of the building will be entirely remodeled, an electric elevator will be installed and other conveniences put in.
