STATE PRINTER AND HIS GRAFT

We are informed that State Printer Dunnaway has enjoined the State University management from securing any printing whatever except from his shop. This means that not only the catalogues and bulletins, but even programs and small jobs of printing, must be sent to Salem, or the warrants will not be issued by the secretary of state against the University appropriation. As The Guard has not been doing the University printing, this paper can express its opinion of this action on the part of the state printer freely and plainly. It means that the University will probably pay a higher price for its printing and that its quality, judging by some of the work already sent out, will be inferior.

The moral to be drawn from this action of the state printer is—well, that graft ought to be cut off. No state office in Oregon should be allowed to net the man who fills it from \$20,000 to \$30,000 a year, and if the legislature would spend one entire session in curtailing or abolishing this graft it would accomplish more for the taxpayers of the state than any legislature has done in years. Dunnaway went into the office because he promised to be decent and not try to get rich in a single term, but he has evidently changed his mind and concluded to set a new pace in hogging everything in sight. In this connection the following Oregonian dispatch is of interest:

State Capitol, Salem, Jan. 25.—Foes of State Printer Dunnaway thus far have been successfully foiled by his friends. Today they dodged the senate committee on printing, Bailey the chairman, by directing a joint committee to draft a bill revising the rates for printing, which have been unchanged since 1878. The revision committee is to be composed of two senators and three representatives. President Bowerman and Speaker McArthur will give control of the committee to Mr. Dunnaway's friends. In the senate today the committee on resolutions, Kay, of Marion, chairman, reported a substitute for Senator Chase's concurrent resolution, that authorized an examination of the state printer's affairs. The substitute authorized a joint committee to draft a revision bill. Mr. Dunnaway has recommended a revision of the rates and stands on his recommendation.

We get a good deal of information sometimes by standing around and keeping our mouths shut. Persons who drifted into a suffragist meeting in Evanston, Ill., the other night, when Mrs. Katherine Waugh McCullough was the speaker, were regaled with the information that Adam, the first inhabitant of the Garden of Eden, was nothing but a worthless loafer. She lauded Eve as the mother of all the arts and sciences. Mrs. McCullough is the only woman justice of the peace in the United States, and ought to know what she is talking about.
