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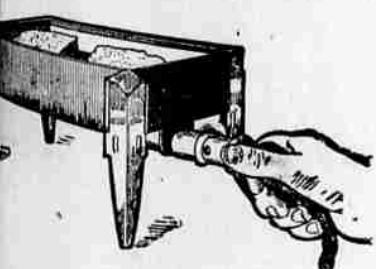

"WICK" LEAVES WITH PIANO ACCOMPANIST

Popular Baritone Singer and
Miss Hazel Patterson Off
for Redding, Calif.

Myron C. Wickham, or "Wick," as he was familiarly known, whose baritone voice has entertained the patrons of the Crescent Theatre, in this city, since its opening last July, and Miss Hazel Patterson, his accompanist on the piano for the past two months, left together last Saturday morning for Redding, Cal., says the Roseburg Review. Friends and acquaintances of the couple pretend to see an elopement, but that they could have gone away for the express purpose of avoiding interference to their marriage is positively denied by Miss Patterson's father, F. F. Patterson, the local contractor and planing mill operator. Miss Patterson is of legal age and therefore entitled to follow her own wishes in such a matter. It is persistently rumored, however, that Wickham's persistent attentions to the young lady (she was constantly in her company) caused a severe jar in the Patterson household.

At the time the couple took their departure for the south, Miss Patterson's father was in Portland. Wm. Periman, owner of the Crescent Theatre, was also out of town, having been in Eugene for ten days. Upon his return to Roseburg Saturday evening, Mr. Periman discovered that Wickham had appropriated the box office receipts of the last four days that he was in charge of the theatre. While Mr. Periman cannot state the exact amount of the money taken, he estimates it at between \$70 and \$80. Wickham left him a note saying he would "square matters up in time," but Mr. Periman has his doubts. He was about decided, however, not to have Wickham arrested for embezzlement. Whether Mr. Patterson will take any action in the matter is not known.

Some doubt exists as to whether Wickham is free to marry. He was married in the east, had trouble with his wife, separated and came west. It is not known if he is divorced. Mr. Periman met him in Eugene last July, paid his fare to Roseburg and employed him as a soloist and machine operator at the theatre. It is the pleasure of Wickham's little child that is thrown on the canvas at the theatre every evening, under the lighting of "Welcome."

Miss Patterson is well known in Roseburg, where she has lived all her life. Previous to being employed at the theatre, she worked as an operator in the central telephone office.

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\$2,000,000 PROJECT IS IN KELSEY'S HANDS

Engineer of Eugene's Proposed
Power Plant Goes to Tacoma
At Salary of \$6000 a Year

Portland, Or., Jan. 23.—Frank C. Kelsey, a well known civil engineer, of Portland, has been employed by the Tacoma city council to design and superintend the construction of the municipal power plant which that city is preparing to build on the Nisqually river, at a cost of \$2,000,000. Mr. Kelsey is to receive an annual salary of \$6,000, and he will be employed two, and probably three, years in constructing the plant.

He leaves for Tacoma tomorrow night for the purpose of conferring with the Tacoma city officials relative to beginning the survey and the preparation of certain ordinances to be passed before the actual work of construction can begin.

M. Kelsey has been a resident of Portland for three years, coming here from Salt Lake City, where he was for five years city engineer. He is now superintending the construction of power plants at McMinnville, Ashland and Eugene. He has been engaged in this class of work on the Pacific coast for a number of years.

STAGE DRIVER AND ENGINEER'S WIFE ELOPE

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 26.—Mrs. Vera Bartlett, wife of an Eugene engineer, and Bert Neely, stage driver on the Roseburg-Marshfield stage line, eloped from here Sunday, taking the stage going toward Marshfield. At Ten Mile Mrs. Bartlett wrote her husband that she wanted to come back. He refused to have anything more to do with her.

Neely still holds his job. He has been driving the stage three years. He was single. Mrs. Bartlett came here from Camas valley, Oregon.

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
