UNDER SUSPICION

Lease of Large Acreage of Mineral Land to Prominent Politician Has a Shady Look

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 28.—The state senate today ordered an investigation of the action of the state land board in leasing eight thousand acres of Nez Perce county mineral land to George W. Thompson, of Lewiston, a prominent politician, for a period of 50 years in consideration of a royalty to be paid the state of fifteen cents a ton for all ore mined. The application for the lease was granted at a meeting of the board on Tuesday, but was not made public.
