ASK FOR RETENTION OF WENDLING TRAIN

Merchants' Association and Commercial Club Petition the S. P. Officials

The Merchants' Protective Association and the Commercial Club today sent to J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the S. P. Co., joint resolutions adopted by both bodies asking that the company retain the Eugene-Wendling train, it being reported that this train will be discontinued when the Albany-Springfield local is extended from the latter place to this city, as stated in The Guard a few days ago.

It was pointed out in the resolutions that the people of Wendling, Marcola and Donna would be greatly inconvenienced in reaching Eugene if the train is discontinued. They would either have to wait till late at night and take the Albany train at Springfield for this city, or when the electric line is completed to the river opposite Springfield, they would have to walk nearly a mile to take the car at the end of the line.

STIGATE COLLEGE AND OAC

Institutions Adding, Which Discovered

may be asked to why the enrollment of Multnomah College at the University during the year, to ascertain the registration of students. Both great legs and feet, but the figures appear to be much of the University. made that O. A. added with the students, short term who come to hear and other side people, who are generally, have sug-

gested that the legislature appoint a committee to examine impartially the record of the students who are enumerated in the rosters of the colleges, and personally see how many are still present in the institutions. In the present rivalry between the two state colleges, there may be padding, and by this plan it may be discovered.

At La Grande last summer, Prof. Horner, the O. A. C. registrar, advertised in the LaGrande Observer, that he would register and assign to classes students who applied to him at the hotel. A question in the mind of a Eugene man is, "would a student who has thus been registered and does not attend college, be counted in the enrollment?"

By the same methods the University could have a thousand students without considering the law and medical departments. A correspondence school is conducted which will probably enroll four or five hundred students before the year is ended. This, added to the music students who will number over 100, would make the University totals be more than a thousand.

Multnomah Registration Leads. For the first time in the history of the University Multnomah county has taken the lead in the enrollment of the institution. Lane county has 134 students and Multnomah 135, according to the President's report, which will be issued in a short time. Multnomah's registration is strictly confided, while perhaps, one-third of the Lane county students were non-residents before they entered college.
