### UNIVERSITY WANTS PENSION FUND FOR RETIRED PROFESSORS

Recommendation for the application for membership in the Carnegie pension fund, which exists for the purpose of retiring college professors on pensions under certain conditions, is made to the legislature by the report of the president of the board of regents, Judge H. S. Bean. If the legislature does not see fit to make the application to the trustees of the fund, the report urges that the state afford some plan of pensioning, not only the Oregon University, but all the higher institutions of the state.

The chief advantage to be gained is the quality of instructors who will accept positions in the state. The most thorough men in the teaching profession always take into account a pensioning fund as well as the salary. Thus every state institution would be benefited by any action on the part of the legislature.

The best Eastern men would come to the state of Oregon more readily and at lower salaries if some pension plan were adopted. As most of the state schools and colleges of the better class are availing themselves of this opportunity, the report states that Oregon must keep step with the movement for mere protection, if not from justice.

### EQUAL SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN OF WASHINGTON

Olympia, Jan. 29.—By a vote of 70 to 18 today the house passed the equal suffrage bill providing for the submission of a constitutional amendment at the next general election. The fate of the bill in the senate is doubtful.

### HAZING, BATH-TUBBING INITIATORY PERFORMANCES UNDER FACULTY BAN

Any kind of hazing, bath-tubbing, initiatory performances, or mistreatment of freshmen or others, that comes before the faculty or the president of the University, will result in the suspension indefinitely or expulsion of any students caught in the hazing, according to the public announcement made by President Campbell at the dormitory last night to the roomers and boarders of the hall.

Heretofore there has been a ruling against hazing, but a distinction was evidently made in the minds of the faculty, which distinguished hazing from bath-tubbing and the little evening smokers which have been a dormitory institution ever since its foundation.

The action is considered the result of the additional severity with which the smokers during the last year have been administered to the candidates—new roomers in the dormitory—and the few cases of mistreatment which have occurred during the last four months.

The House this afternoon passed the five of the six amendments to the 1907 session that were vetoed by the governor and passed over his veto at this time.

Four of these amendments were for agricultural districts in Oregon and amendments of from \$1500 to \$2000. The other amendment was for the garnishment of the officials. The sixth amendment, Senator Beach proposed, was for the change of voting machines by indefinite postponement.
