CHAMBERLAIN WILL SOON RESIGN OFFICE

Go East on March 1 to Assume Duties As U. S. Senator—Special Session Expected

State House, Salem, Or., Feb. 2.—Governor Chamberlain will leave Oregon for Washington the latter part of February, in the belief that there may be a special session of congress and if so that he may be sworn in on March 4.

He has sent a letter to Washington to learn whether or not, when the senate meets in executive session immediately after Taft is inaugurated as president to confirm his appointments, there is any likelihood that newly appointed senators will be sworn in at that time.

This information comes from an authoritative source. In the same connection it is stated that before leaving Oregon the governor will file his resignation with the secretary of state, to take effect when he is sworn in as United States senator. In the event that this takes place, he will then need only to wire Secretary of State Benson that he has assumed the office of United States senator, and the resignation will become effective.

The statement is made as coming direct from Mr. Chamberlain that at no time has he ever considered the proposition of resigning the governorship until he was confirmed as senator. If he ever had such a notion, it is added, it vanished away when certain senators and representatives voted for him under protest, and the chance of meeting with resistance in attaining his ambition at Washington presented itself.

FRIENDS OF BEER BEFORE LEGISLATURE

Salem, Feb. 2.—Ministers and hop growers tonight appeared before the house committee on revision of laws and discussed the bill proposed by the hop growers and dealers of Marion exempting beer from the local option law.

The bill provides that a special election shall be held when the people of a precinct shall decide whether or not the sale of beer shall be allowed in their precinct. The measure probably will be recommended favorably by the committee.

F. W. Durbin, H. B. Thielson, E. Hofer, C. P. Bishop, F. P. Baumgartner and Conrad Krebs told of the importance of the hop industry to this state and urged the enactment of the bill that the people might decide for themselves the question of whether or not beer might be sold in the precinct in which they lived. Mr. Krebs said that during the last ten years this industry had brought into the state \$30,000,000, but that since 1906 and the enforcement of the local option law \$9000 acres had been plowed up. The harvesting of the crop alone, he said, furnished employment annually to 100,000 people.

Monmouth, Or., Feb. 2.—Commencement exercises at Monmouth Normal began Saturday night with a reception given by the second and third year students. Bean, of Eugene, delivering the address. Williams, Eugene; Miss Lathrop, North Yamhill, and Mrs. Daisy Thomas, Hood River. Each has secured a school.
