FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, Feb. 5.—The ruling style of fashion seems to be in a state of transition at the present moment. A new style will be evolved perhaps even more than one, but what their particular character will be it is impossible to predict with any degree of certainty at this moment. The dress ideas of the moment are still carried out in two different types of gowns. One is the clinging, close-fitting princess or the semi-princess dress, the other the draped dress made in soft, limp, bodiless materials. The one-piece gown is still the favorite although the two-piece and combination gown is quite popular.

While the scanty plain skirt is the most conspicuous model seen in the smart winter gowns, other skirts are in evidence among the most recently made tailormades. One is the plaited nine-gore skirt, for the joy of women who have waited anxiously for its return. This new skirt has no plaits at the top and is stitched to the knees. Below that point the plaits are left free. Another new skirt has five, seven or nine gores, but has plaited panels set in the side seams.

Only a few days ago word came from Paris that the skirted skirt and over-drapery were looked upon there with favor. A model showing such a skirt, found its way across the ocean and was shown in one of the fashionable shops on Broadway. It had an old-fashioned light fitting coat, the skirt of which ended some six inches above the knees. In front it was cutaway, and the sleeves were tight without the slightest fullness at the armhole.

Marked attention is given to plain tailored effects and the spring models exhibited in the shops have considerably less trimming than those of the past winter. The popularity of the little demicostume has brought about the vogue of the separate coat. There are stoles and hoods, all of which follow the outline of the academic periods.

Extremely long tassels play a conspicuous part in their trimming and they are fashioned from chenille and knotted silk threads. This style is unquestionably elegant and will continue in favor throughout the spring and summer.

The majority of women prefer unobtrusive styles, something that they do not tire of too easily, and it is for this reason that the semi-fitted garments have become popular. They hang in soft, graceful folds, seeming to outline more than to follow the lines of the figure.

This rule holds good in both dresses and coats. They are cut so as to give a slender effect at the hips and long, straight lines at the back. One-piece dresses are the accepted models of the season and the styles are varied sufficiently to give scope to individual taste. The Princess and Empire waist treatments seem to be the most popular and are widely accepted for the reason that they are becoming to the majority of the women. But only the slender and well shaped women will dare to wear the extreme Directoire or the unmodified Empire gown.

The two-piece dress, known as the compromise and promises to remain in vogue through the spring and summer. These gowns have the waist copied after the Empire idea and the skirt after the Directoire. Then there are three-piece suits, the newest of which are made with sep-

arate guimpes in place of the separate waist, the latter being joined to the skirt at the high waistline. An unusually pretty dress of this pattern was of cashmere of dark gray, trimmed with Bengaline in connection with a coat of Bengaline. The separate guimpe was of net tucked and braided.

All toilettes of dress and of ceremony are of silken tissues nowadays. Silk, rather left in the background for several years, is pursued now with a lively ardor. In plain silks and satins, in crepes and metors, or fine cord, the dress-makers, to say nothing of the silk-faced satin in cloth and silk cashmere, they present a wonderful variety from which to select material for a costume. The draping, wrinkling folds of these soft, thick stuffs, in their colors, show changing lights like those of precious stones, or reflect the metallic glow of silver, gold, or bronze.

Fashion has declared emphatically in favor of the long sleeve and where the short sleeve is used at all in shirtwaists during the coming season, it will be in a three-quarter length and on the distinctly "warm-weather" waist. Nothing is more comfortable than a free fore arm for any kind of athletics or house-work, and for those two purposes the short sleeve will never quite die out. But in the really smart, well tailored shirt-waists one will rarely see anything but the long sleeve, and the plainer the better.

There is an excellent sleeve that is being put in the best waists just now, a sort of leg-o-mutton shirt-waist sleeve that fits in to the cuff without any fullness at all. Sometimes it is used with a rather severe type of waist, six tucks on each shoulder in front and a two-piece yoke in back. One in white linen had the edges of the center front plait bound with pink linen, and just inside the binding narrow rows of feather stitching done in the same color.

Clever women have found out that a separate tunic, made of another material than the gown and draped over it, is an excellent method of alternating an old-fashioned frock. There are some frocks that are too short in the skirts to be lifted up even for two inches on the bodice to give the Empire effect, and that are too much out of style to wear as they are. If the skirt and bodice are put together by their linings and two or three folds of self-colored material neatly draped around the waistline in order to make it invisible, the foundation work is finished. The tunic may be made of net, chiffon cloth, bands of net and embroidered satin, or all-over lace, edged with fur or gold galloon. This is cut with a seam down the middle of the back and neatly draped three inches above the waistline, headed with folds of the material or a piece of the trimming used elsewhere. This tunic drops from bust to knees and gives the exact line that it needs this winter on smart frocks.

On some of the latest imported gowns the waist is lengthened, not

by dipping the encircling band or girder, but by the actual fitting and placing of the natural line. And while it is a far cry to the hour-glass figure, waists are really more tapering. The trimmings are still arranged for the broad, flat effect and must not, under any conditions, slope in at the waist and then out again, but less width will be required for style.

Costures are becoming less voluminous and more natural. Some of these false puffs are being put aside and their hair arranged more closely to accommodate the new spring hats, which will not need the abundance of hair, which was almost necessary to prop up the drooping winter hats. Gauze, silver and gold bands are now drawn quite closely over the hair to hold it down.
