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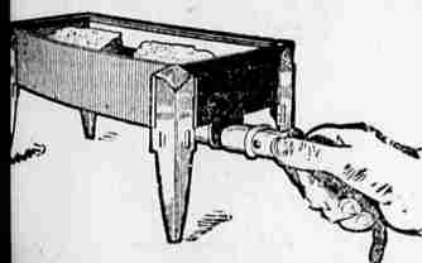

LABOR LEADERS

IN CONFERENCE

Council of Labor Now In Session at the Capital of the Nation

Washington, Feb. 10.—To the list of notable conferences initiated by the present administration for the consideration of questions of great public concern another was added today when the "Council of Labor" assembled for its first meeting at the Department of Commerce and Labor to discuss questions of vital moment to the wage earners of the country. The problem of the unemployed, and how, to what extent, the division of information in the Department of Commerce and Labor, can be most helpful to that class, especially during the periods of depression, is probably the most important matter to receive the attention of the conference. In the same connection the general subject of immigration is to be discussed in all its phases. Other questions to figure in the council's deliberations include the advisability of extending the steamboat inspection service to include the inspection of locomotive boilers on interstate railroads and how the division on information of the Department of Commerce and Labor may be administered for the best interest of the wage-earners generally.

Among the prominent labor leaders invited to the conference and the most of whom responded to the invitation, were Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor; Warren S. Stone, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers; W. S. Carter, grand master of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen; W. G. Lee, grand master of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen; Frank T. Hawley, president of the Switchmen's Union of North America; T. L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers; James M. Lynch, president of the International Typographical Union; George W. Perkins, president of the Cigar-makers' International Union; and Andrew Furuseth, president of the Seamen's International Union.
