Rules of Study Tour Contest
Rule 1. Pupils earning votes in the spelling contest may cast such votes for the candidate of their choice.

Rule 2. Subscribers may cast the voting coupon found in each copy of the School and Home.

Rule 3. County choice. The teacher receiving the highest number of votes in any county will be declared the choice of that county.

Rule 4. Winning candidate. The county casting the highest number of votes in the group will be declared the winning group, and its leading candidate will be the delegate to the exposition to go as the guest of the School and Home.

Rules of Spelling Contest
Rule 1. The children will be classified in three sections according to grades, the teachers' classifications being the basis.

Grades 3 and 4 will constitute division A; 5 and 6 division B; 7 and 8, division C. In schools where the grammar grade work is divided by the course of study into nine grades, the pupils of the ninth grade will spell with division C.

Rule 2. The School and Home has selected a list of 3000 words—1000 for each of the three divisions. These words have been chosen with reference to the advancement of the respective divisions and will be printed in the January, February, March and April issues—250 words each month for each division. These words will also be printed on slips for the use of the children in studying the words at home.

Rule 3.—The final spelling test will be based upon a list of 50 words for each division, chosen by a committee of county superintendents from the lists printed for study. These test words will be sent in sealed envelopes to the teachers of contesting schools in time for the final contest.

Rule 4. These envelopes will be opened by the teachers in the presence of the class at 11 o'clock May 7, 1909. The teacher will pronounce the words and the contesting pupils will write them. Words may be defined by the teacher or used in sentences to make the meaning clearer. Children will be tested only in the division to which they belong.

Rule 5. The teachers will collect papers, grade them and immediately report results to the School and Home office on blanks provided for the purpose.

Rule 6. Each child will be entitled to one vote for every test word which he spells correctly.

CORRUPTION RULES CITY IN KANSAS

Topeka, Kas., Feb. 10.—For levying a tribute on "joints" and alleged resorts, J. T. Harsha, Mayor of Hutchinson, Kan., and W. H. Dixon, chief of police, will be ousted from office and the city of Hutchinson will be enjoined from exercising the rights of a corporation. The special master, W. D. McKeever, filed his report to this effect in the Supreme Court today.

Similar findings are made with reference to Joseph Howard, Assistant marshal, and W. A. Meadows, a patrolman.

JUNE 5 SELECTED FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE MEET

George W. Hug, secretary of the Northwest Intercollegiate Conference has received word that June 5 is the date decided on for the conference track and field meet to be held in Seattle under auspices of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition. This meet supplants the old triangular meet, which has been held yearly in Seattle between Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The conference meet is of the six Northwest colleges—Washington, Idaho, Pullman, Whitman, Oregon and O. A. C.

LA SALLE THROWS SCHOLTES THREE TIMES IN AN HOUR

Match Was Exciting and Fast—Men Make Good Impression

The wrestling match between Joe LaSalle of this city and William Scholtes of The Dalles, was won by the local man, who threw the visitor three times within an hour as agreed. A preliminary bout between Hannavan and Watson was won by Watson. Bill Hayward refereed the match.

LaSalle took fifty-two minutes to flop Scholtes three times. The first throw came after thirty minutes of intensely exciting work with a crotch and arm hold. Scholtes escaped several hard grips of LaSalle by bridging. The other two throws came after fourteen and eight minutes of wrestling, respectively, the holds being combinations of LaSalle's scissors grips, which he uses so much.

After the match Scholtes expressed the opinion that LaSalle could beat O'Connell. He claimed that LaSalle weighed twenty-one pounds more than himself last night. Both men made an excellent impression on the public.

CALIFORNIA BACKS DOWN ON NITS ANTI-JAP LEGISLATION

Sacramento, Cal., Feb. 10.—Yielding to the pressure brought to bear by President Roosevelt and Governor Gillett, the California Assembly retired from its previous position on the anti-Japanese bills today by reconsidering the former vote on the segregation of Japanese students in the public schools and finally rejecting the measure by a vote of 41 to 37. An effort by the supporters of the bill to reconsider further was lost by a tie vote and the Assembly is now clear of any anti-Japanese measure objected to by the National Administration.

The fight for the suppression of the bill was won after many hours of heated debate on the floor.
