FADS AND FASHIONS

(Guard Special Service.)

New York Feb. 13.—It is predicted by Lefrier, who conducts one of the leading dress making establishments in Paris, that the color most in vogue for spring toilets, will be a soft shade of prune, known as the Pomme d'Or, which is a decided different, but fully as attractive, will be Pomme d'Or.

The Pomme d'Or is quite different from any reds that have been seen for many years. It is something of a brick tone, something of a Bordeaux, something of a China rose, and yet, when placed near any of these colors, stands out entirely apart. The peculiar tone must be seen to be appreciated, and for a description it is almost exclusively for winter, but this shade of Pomme d'Or is soft and seductive, and not in the least indicative of heat.

Prune has been more or less a leader all the season in Paris, but it is a densely dark prune, bordering on black. The new violet is delicate, transparent in effect, rich and is becoming to almost any complexion. White will be much used with it; in fact, there will be as great splashes of white on all toilets during the summer as there were splashes of black during the winter. However, comminglings of black are not going to be ousted by any means. Black will surely remain with us for many months to come.

Lefrier is also the author of another prediction; that the grotesque high-waisted, tight-skirted costumes will die a natural and deserved death this month. At the end of the month when the leading houses give out their spring ideas, none of the impossible robes will have a place. Skirts will be much fuller; the waistline will drop almost to the location nature intended for it; corsage will take on better lines and sleeves will be more ample at the top.

One must not suppose, however, that buffantry will characterize the modes, for each will not be the case. Gowns will continue to outline the figure more or less, but ideas will tend to bring out the good points more than to destroy them. The robe-collant or glue-tight dress will remain, but only in the form of a suggestion.

Speaking of colors, it may be mentioned, that golden yellow is another color which promises to become extremely fashionable during the coming season. That peculiar kind of first that has many points in its favor, it shows well under electric light, as well as in day light, and is becoming to most complexions. It is now dyed with a golden sheen that carries out the prevailing fashion for gold in everything.

The heavy ribbed silk that used to be called bengaline and is now called Ottoman, and which came into fashion last autumn, is out in a new and cozier weave for afternoon frocks. Heretofore its chief use has been for trimming and fashioning hats, for revers and cuffs, for separate coats and for mufflers. Now indoor gowns will be made of it on Empire lines.

One of the popular fancies is to give it an iridescent coloring. Black and deep red make an excellent combination for that purpose. Gray and green also is highly effective in combination. In plain colors the new material has been dyed into that effective peacock green and blue and also into taupe. It makes up into good looking frocks, because the coarse cord running through gives it character, yet the weave is so soft, it swings into the line. Along with this soft new silk come shot velvets in two tones. Another new fabric is fine tulle sprinkled with heavy velvet flowers and velvet in fine stripes, alternating with satin.

On white frocks and muslin blouses that are being early made up for spring, there is a plentiful showing of colored embroideries. The shops offer a large variety of it, and promise that it will be in first style all through the warm weather season. It will be especially popular on wash shirtwaists that fasten down the front and are to be worn every day. Violet in two or three shades is quite to the front, and its rivals are pale blue, jade green and euhait blue. The latter is quite effective and gives a good touch to a dark blue suit. The embroidery comes in edging and insertion.

Since fashion is steadily repeating the styles of the Byzantine epoch the jeweled effects are coming more into favor. The new thing is a six-inch girdle or cinchure of cloth of gold or silver or of metal lace lined with the metal cloth. This does not quite reach down to the waist line, or it would throw the gown into false lines. It starts over the bust and reaches to within an inch or two of the waist line proper. On this foundation immense colored stones are sewn. Blue, yellow, coral and crystals are all mingled. None of them are small and they follow some barbaric pattern. This girdle is worn on black gowns of satin, mousseline or tulle. They are considered smart on the ultra fashionable frocks of tulle and lace or tulle. It is safe to say that the fabrics of the gown itself are never repeated above the bust. This is true of high and low gowns. Everything over neck and shoulders is transparent. Even colored laces, dyed to match the cloth are more fashionable for shoulder draperies than the cloth itself.

French makers are showing great preference for cotton crepe in lingerie frocks this season. It is, however, by no means the fabric we ordinarily get in the shops here under that name, but a far flimsier, more crinkly material, crisper and more transparent. It is indeed charming for costumes and lends itself well to embroidery and for combination with the best laces. The convenience of cotton crepe is great, as it can be laundered over and over and requires no ironing. It need only be hung up to dry, and the next morning one has a fresh gown ready.

ONE OF THE NOTABLES OF THE YUKON.

N. A. FULLER OF DAWSON, WHO "GRUSTAKED" THE DISCOVERERS OF THE GREAT TREADWELL MINES.

N. A. Fuller, old time Klondiker, a man who came into this camp with less than 50 cents in his pocket and only what possessions he carried on his back and has worked up to the position of millionaire, head of water work, coal mines, placer properties, electric light properties, steamboat lines, telephone syndicates and the like, is referred to in a recent pictorial written in the Seattle Post-Intelligencer as being one of the important pioneers of Alaska. A full page writeup of Juneau and the early pioneers of Alaska is given in the writeup and Mr. Fuller is credited with the important fact of having outfitted Joe Juneau and his partner, Harris, on a prospecting expedition which resulted in the discovery of the Treadwell mines, now the biggest quartz proposition in the world.

Mr. Fuller was a young man at Sitka at the time. He made a fortune in Alaskan coast enterprises, but by the time the Klondike was struck he had need of another and once more joined the throng of wealth seekers. Leaving the outside with no capital, he came to Dawson and got down to first principles again in 1898 on Bonanza with pick and shovel at daily wages. But the indomitable will and active mind won got him on the upward track and he began organizing and selling properties resulting eventually in the turning over of some of the richest properties on Bonanza, and now he is one of the richest men from Nome to Seattle.—Dawson Daily News.
