state," the speaker continued, "is the rural school problem. Some day every child in the state, however isolated, will be given as an inherent right as good an education as the children of the city.
"For a remedy I would compel the experienced teachers to go to the country schools at good salaries, and the inexperienced teachers to be sent to the cities under adequate supervision. But first we must pay good salaries, and if possible, provide for some sort of remuneration for old age."
Schmidt Talks.
After Ackerman Alfred C. Schmidt talked on the subject, "Co-ordination of Activities of Agencies of Secondary and Higher Education." The speaker is cashier of the First National Bank at Albany, and has taken a great interest in school problems.

RANKIN MUSIC STORE ROBBERS ARE CAUGHT

Dep. Sheriff Hammond Locates Them at Starbuck, Wash. Will Be Brought Here

The two men who entered Savage & Lawrence's music store, formerly Rankin's, a few nights ago and stole a number of musical instruments, have been caught at Starbuck, Wash., and an officer will leave here tonight or tomorrow for Olympia, where requisition papers for the men will be secured, and they will be brought back.

It will be remembered that a small panel in a side door of the store was broken out a few evenings ago and a very small man or a boy entered the place and carried away the instruments. Deputy Sheriff Hammond and Chief of Police Farrington searched the city for several days for the criminals but failed to locate them here. Chief Farrington found that the cleaver with which the door panel was knocked out had been stolen from a restaurant on West Eighth street, but further than that, no trace of the thieves could be found here. Deputy Sheriff Hammond then communicated with the chief of police in the principal cities of the Northwest and succeeded in locating the goods in the O. R. & N. express office at Portland. They were shipped there under the name of Jackson. They were then shipped from Portland to Spokane under the name of McKay, and Deputy Hammond wired to the officers there to watch out for anyone who would call for them. The express agent at Spokane received a telegram from Starbuck, Wash., to ship the goods to that place. The officers allowed them to be shipped and waited at the express office at Starbuck, arresting the men as they called for the goods. They gave their names as Joseph Brown and F. G. Lawrence. A telegram to Deputy Hammond, appraising him of their capture was received this morning.

The thieves were shrewd and showed that they were experienced in their line of business. They boxed the instruments up and took them to the Eugene depot at midnight on the night of the burglary and shipped them to Portland by express. Henry Kissinger, the night messenger, making out the papers. This was not learned, however, until the goods were located in Portland.
About \$400 worth of goods were stolen. In the lot there were a number of mandolins, guitars, violins, talking machines and two cornets.

CHRIS MARX, SR., HAS PASSED BEYOND

Prominent Citizen of Eugene For Thirty Years Succumbs to Ravages of Disease

Christian Marx, Sr., died at his home at the corner of East Ninth and Pearl streets in Eugene last night at 9:40 o'clock, after quite a long illness of arteriosclerosis, or hardening of the arterial walls. He was taken to a sanatorium in Portland only a short time ago in hopes that the treatment there would benefit him, but he continued to grow worse and was brought home only two or three days ago. He continued to decline until death came.
Decedent was born on Nov. 1, 1851, at Newark, N. J. He came west to California when 18 years of age and lived for a time at Yreka. He came to Portland in 1870 and was married on May 10, 1875 to Miss Caroline Hochman. They came to Eugene in February, 1879. Besides his wife, he leaves three sons, George, Chris, Jr., and Ralph, a brother Martin Marx, at Etna Mills, Cal., and a brother, August Marx at Newark, N. J. There is another brother, George Marx, whose whereabouts are at present unknown.
