### BOWLERS AT PITTSBURG

American Bowling Congress Opened in That City Today

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 27.—The ninth annual tournament of the American Bowling Congress, the blue-ribbon event of the ten-pin world, began in this city today under conditions that give promise of the most successful as well as the largest tournament of the kind ever held. For three weeks—Sundays excepted—the rumbling and rolling noise of the alleys will echo through the Duquesne Gardens, as the crack top-pin players from all over the world.

The sharpest kind of competition is looked for in all the events, five-men, two-men and individual. The entry list includes the best players of the country. The East is particularly well represented. The bowlers of the Middle West are also much in evidence. Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, Columbus, Milwaukee, Indianapolis and numerous other cities as far West as Denver have good-sized delegations on hand. Canada has sent some of her best players to uphold the reputation of the dominion.

### NEW GYM BY NEXT FALL

Building Will Be 70x120 Feet in Length—New Equipment

The new gymnasium at the University is expected to be finished by the beginning of the next school year. The building will be 70x120 feet, the floor space 60x120 feet. There will be a running track of cork on the balcony which will be 17 laps to the mile. A swimming tank 20x40 feet is another of the many new features of the gymnasium, a bowling alley and a sun bath gallery over the bowling alley 12x20 feet in length. This is considered by Mr. Hayward one of the most important of all the new equipments. The seating capacity of the gallery will be 400. There will be two cloak rooms and the floor of the gymnasium may be used for dancing.

This bit of color to the scandal that has remained in rumor form until the present time is likely to kill the wrestling game here, it is feared.

One hundred dollars was the sum the Multnomah Club wrestler paid Heinrich to lay down, according to Miller. And he paid this sum through Miller, the deal being effected on the street on Heinrich's written offer, it is alleged.
