DAIRMEN OF SIUSLAW HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Election of Officers and Other Business Is Transacted At Florence

The regular annual meeting of the Siuslaw Dairymen's Association for the election of officers and transaction of other business, was held in Florence last Saturday. There was a good attendance of the members, besides a number of outsiders present. The past year has been a prosperous one for the organization, and the dairymen have received a good price for their output. This is due in a large part to the better facilities for handling cream and the cheaper transportation which the association has brought about by co-operative methods in the work.

On motion the time for holding the annual meeting of the association was changed from the third Saturday in February to the Saturday following the first Friday in January. It was voted to allow the secretary a salary of twenty dollars per year for his services. A change was also made in the term the directors shall hold office. One director was elected for one year, two for two years, and two for three years. Hereafter the directors are to hold office for three years instead of one year as formerly.

The directors elected are as follows: three years, Eugene McCornack and R. W. Johnson; two years, R. Hensley and A. P. Knowles; one year, M. D. Scott.

C. H. Frazer, field manager for the Corvallis Creamery Co., then made a few remarks, complimenting the association on their success thus far and predicting a bright future for the

dairy industry in this section. The secretary handed out the following statistics of the business of the association during the past year. Whole amount of cream shipped, 103,942 pounds; amount of butter fat it contains, 53,505 pounds; total expense for hauling \$2714.48. The average cost of hauling was about five cents per pound of butter fat. The average test of the cream was about 51 per cent.

As the cream ordinarily delivered at the creamery usually tests about 39 to 43 per cent of butter fat it shows that the cream sent out from the lower Siuslaw country gave a very high test.—Florence West.
