PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, March 4.—The sharp competition which has been waging among some of the larger buyers of the coast seems to have come to an end. While there has been practically no change in quotations the buyers are not nearly so anxious to buy as they were, indicating that if the present condition continues for awhile none of them will be paying the present premium for supplies. The fact is that hides were never worth the money that some of the competing dealers have offered and paid during the past month or two, but in their efforts to break into the market the outsiders gave up all their profits for awhile.

Mistaken As to Eggs
That the front street trade in general was mistaken in its views of the egg market is shown on all sides, for not only is the market at present holding very firm at higher prices, but during recent days the demand has been better than supplies. Just how long this condition will continue cannot even be guessed at just now, for the reason that the market has been very erratic this season, and most dealers have quit predicting as to the future. One of the larger front street handlers sends out the following circular explaining the market:

"In our letter of a week since we advised that it was our opinion that values on eggs would soon be lower. Well, we were entirely mistaken, and from day to day prices have advanced, and we are at present, and for two or three days past, have been getting 24c. Demand has been very good, and receipts have been but ordinary. We are very glad that our predictions in regard to prices were wrong, and that we have been able to do so well by shippers. We consider present prices very good ones for eggs at this season, and advise shippers to get in their goods as fast as they are ready—market them as soon as you can."

Poultry Market in Good Shape
The poultry market is still in very good shape along front street. Receipts are not nearly up to expectations, and the result is that some of the larger handlers, who had made an effort to bear down on the market, are actually bringing in supplies from the East to fill the wants of their trade.

Demand in poultry includes all lines with the possible exception of turkeys, and in that line the trade is dull. Broilers and fryers are selling up as high as 25 cents a pound.

Dealers Lose On Onions
That the Confederated Onion Growers' Association is making a most serious mistake in holding its supplies for 12 or better and allowing the stocks to rot rather than sell them for less, is the opinion of those dealers who are very friendly to the organization. "I believe that the association is making even a worse mistake now in not getting rid of its poor onions than it did when it put the business into two dealers' hands," says a shipper who has been hit all times a supporter of the organization and its methods. "This time they are making a mistake, for I believe it is better to take half a loaf when a whole loaf cannot be obtained. While they will probably be compelled to accept low prices for their non-selling stock, they will more than make up for this on the good quality, which will in all probability sell very high."

Locally the onion market is stagnant, and several dealers are an effort to get rid of some of their surplus supply.

plies sent them to the outside, and received on an average of \$1.35 per hundred pounds. This is 15c under what the association is asking for stocks at country stations.

Egg Receipts Light
The continued light receipts of eggs indicate that Valley shippers are finding some other outlet than Portland, probably Seattle. With the moderate arrivals and active demand, the local market was firm yesterday at 24@25 cents.

There was a fair supply of poultry yesterday and a good demand at the prices that have ruled for some time past. Dealers also report inquiry for dressed poultry of various kinds, and quote chickens at 17 1/2c, turkeys at 22 1/2@25c, and geese at 12 1/2@14c, but at these figures the dressed stock must be fat.

Butter prices were firmly maintained on city and outside brands.

Prime Turkeys in the Market
There is a firmer feeling in the potato market, because of renewed inquiry from various parts of California. While the local shipping trade still quoted \$1.25 at country points, there were unconfirmed rumors that better prices were being paid in the interior. There has been no advance yet at San Francisco to justify higher prices here, and if an advance has been paid, it was speculative.

The onion market was rather quiet. Five cars were sold for shipment south, but nothing could be placed on the south.

Seavey Buys 1907 Hops

The J. W. Seavey Hop Company yesterday bought the J. L. Smith lot of 186 bales of 1907 hops at Tualatin at 3 cents. There is more inquiry for olds and consequently a firmer tone in the market. Some dealers consider 1907s at the current price a better speculation than 1908s.

No business in last year's crop was reported in the local market. Contracting was also quiet.

Asparagus is Lower

Lower prices have been named on both spot and future California canned asparagus than were quoted at the opening of last year, and this is in spite of the fact that the grounds of Hickmott and the California Central Canning Company, who raise the larger portion of asparagus in California, are covered with water.

It is stated that sufficient asparagus of last year's pack is still in stock at San Francisco to supply the needs of the canning year. For this reason much lower prices on asparagus are expected in the coming season.

PORTLAND LIVESTOCK MARKET

Portland Union Stockyards, March 4.—The cattle market is full of supplies and prices are down 25c today. This decline is not due to any serious change in the statistical position of the market, but to a temporary glut of supplies.

With packers' wants on a nominal basis and with quite liberal supplies coming forward, late arrivals of cattle have not brought such liberal prices as during the preceding week. That the weakness shown today is not likely to continue for any great length of time is the opinion of the livestock trade in general.

Even the lower range of values did not induce killers to take all the offerings today, and even from last night some cattle were carried over, but this is not likely to have any serious effect upon the values in the near future.

Hogs are Firm at 7.25
The present hog market will not range over 7.25 because no supplies are coming forward that will bring over that figure. Killers are inclined to hold back when asked more than this price for the small stuff coming forward, even though the arrivals are very scant.

Some of the best hogs are coming forward just now and the market remains about as previously quoted.

"Women drew water in that country, but not in the heat of the day. The fact that this woman came at noon shows that she was an outcast of the city. She did not want to be seen; she was both surprised and disappointed when she saw Christ there. She tried to have the last word, but in vain. He waited for no introduction. His only passion was love. He asked for a drink and did not get it. Think of the Son of God coming to this earth and asking for a drink and not getting it. And He asked a woman."

"If we had more men like their Master, we would have more good women. Every woman should love Christ, for if it had not been for Him and His gospel, every woman in this land would be debased in the eyes of men. This woman, under the touch of his love and sympathy, before night convinced half of her city that He was the Christ, though no one that morning would have taken her word for anything. Have you, Christian women of Eugene, ever been worth as much to your Savior?"
