Yard Foreman White, of Brown Lumber Co., Resigns—Other Items

Yard Foreman C. J. White has tendered his resignation to the Brown Lumber Co., and on March 15th will go to Junction City to reside, where he owns a fine 12-acre fruit tract in the southern suburbs of that city, part of which is set to prune trees, which are in bearing. Mr. White will set out more fruit trees on his tract, and also establish a large lumber yard at Junction. He will also engage in the poultry business as a kind of side line, making Barred Rocks and Leghorns his specialty. Mr. Mark P. Garrouette will succeed Mr. White as foreman at the Brown Lumber Co.'s mill.

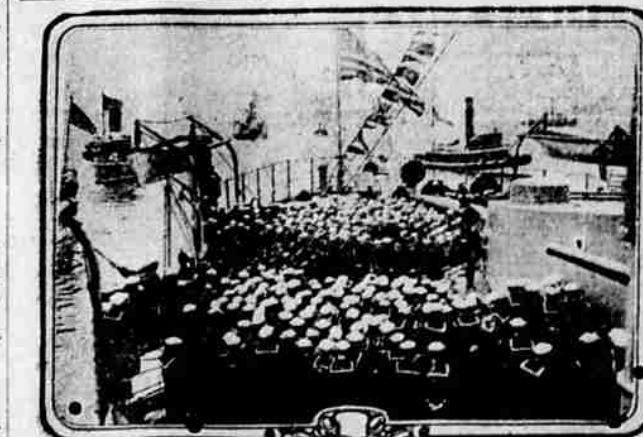

Courtland Green, who was pardoned from the Oregon penitentiary about a month ago, where he was serving a life sentence for complicity in the murder of old man Linn in Lane county, has written the following letter to Mrs. Phoebe Whitlow, at Salem, who was largely instrumental in securing his pardon:

"Harrison, Feb. 16, 1909.
"Mrs. Phoebe Whitlow.
"My Very Dear Friend: No doubt you think I have forgotten you by not writing before; but I assure you that is not the case. There is hardly an hour of the day that my thoughts are not of you and Mrs. Porter.

"Mother and Aunt Media are in bed asleep. Mother is so much better; you can't imagine how much she has improved; but I don't think Auntie is quite so strong. You know that was such a long journey for them.

"We are here with my sister. Do you know, Mrs. Whitlow, I shook hands with friends while at my brother's at Burwell, Neb., until my arm was lame. We think of going back this fall and settling there as there are so many that want me to start a tailor shop.

"Remember me to Mrs. Porter and say my next letter will be to her. Mother and Auntie send love to you both. It is getting so late will have to close.

MEMBER OF FIRST LEGISLATURE DIES

Samuel Scott, Harrisburg Pioneer, Passes Beyond at Age of 85 Years

Harrisburg, Mar. 6.—Samuel Scott died last night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Emma A. Sabin. Mr. Scott had reached the age of 85, having been born in St. Clair, Ohio, March 19, 1823.

He came to Oregon by ox team in 1853 and has been a part of Oregon as it were, in the making, having been elected to the first legislature as a representative of the year of Oregon's admittance as a state. It is said Mr. Scott was the last living member of the first legislature of our state.

Mr. Scott and Geo. H. Williams were very warm friends in the early days of statehood, also, they spent a great deal of their time together as boys back in Ohio. Mr. Scott has been a Mason almost fifty years.

He leaves two daughters and a son to mourn his departure. They are, Mrs. Emma A. Sabin, Harrisburg, Or.; Mrs. Alice M. Beeler, Gaston, Or.; and W. W. Scott, of Idaho.
