HOBOS CHARGED WITH MURDER

Lads Who Stole Cigars and
Other Articles From Hotel
Wanted for Serious Crime

Last December at Goble in Columbia county, an old man who worked in the railroad yards for about 18 years, was murdered. He was of Indian blood and a distant relative of Mrs. F. B. Richmond, who has been cooking in the Junction City hotel for the past year, says the Times. This old man was murdered for his money and was found in his cabin with his head split open with a hatchet. He lived alone and it was supposed that he had quite a large sum of money. A reward of \$1,000 is offered for the apprehension of his murderers.

Last December two young men came to this city and each secured a job in the hotel as night cook and dish washer. The boys boasted of a crime they had committed and told Mrs. Richmond about the murder of an old man at Goble with a hatchet. Mrs. Richmond communicated these facts to Mrs. Effie Fowler and she notified the sheriff of Columbia county. In the meantime these boys could not get their wages from the hotel proprietor, and skipped out after having helped themselves to a couple boxes of cigars.

Before leaving they gave their pictures to a young lady acting as waitress and by this means the whereabouts of these men was discovered. It now develops that there were three engaged in the murder. One of them has been arrested and wants to turn state's evidence. The sheriff of Columbia county was here Saturday hot on their trail. The evidence against the boys here is all circumstantial but pretty strong. They gave their names as Jack Lewis and George McGarther but it is not believed that these are their true names. They are supposed to be in Roseville, California.

NOTES FROM THE

LABOR WORLD

A union of ladies' garment cutters was established in Boston recently. Stationary firemen at San Francisco have decided to establish a death benefit.

A branch of the American association for labor legislation has been formed in Minneapolis.

The request of Hamilton, Ont., civic employees for an increase of their salaries is likely to be disregarded.

Union granite cutters at Boston have not received an advance of their wages for five years and are becoming dissatisfied.

London, Canada, has a movement to form a civic federation to promote a better understanding between capital and labor.

Twenty-three legislative propositions endorsed by the Workmen's Federation of the state of New York have been embodied in a bill before the legislature.

In less than ten years, it is reported, Brockton, Mass., has lost 6,400 skilled workmen, the result of the removal of the various shoe shops to other quarters.

The national league for industrial education, an organization, which has for its chief aim the improvement of the condition of skilled workmen, was recently formed.

Of the 8,456 diamond workers belonging to the Diamond Workers Association of Amsterdam, 6,456 were out of employment during the recent industrial crisis, but now there are only 377 unemployed.

Special committees of the St. Paul and Minneapolis Engineers' Unions are to press a measure in the state legislature providing that engineers in the state shall be licensed after passing an examination.

Two bills, designed to regulate the loaning of money on wages to be earned in future and to curtail the operations of so-called "loan-sharks" are pending in the assembly of New York legislature.

The Sacramento Cal. Labor Temple Association has up to the present time disposed of 31,817 shares of the capital stock and has on hand \$5,144. It is expected that the temple to be built soon will cost about \$55,000.

The Trades Assembly of St. Paul, Minn., has gone on record as opposing the bill now before the legislature, which provides for the election of the labor commissioner by popular vote. Its legislative committee has been charged to work against the bill.

Governor Dickerson of Nevada has called a conference of the labor organizations of that state to meet in Carson City and will ask their advice and suggestions in regard to a number of important bills more or less affecting labor, that may be acted on by the legislature.

Announcement is made that an agreement, granting a reduction of working hours from ten to nine has been reached between the officials of the Southern railway at Washington, D. C., and the shopmen, who have been demanding such a reduction for some time. There will be no change in the wages scale.

EXTRA SESSION

HAS BEEN CALLED

Legislators Will Meet At Salem on Monday, March the 15th

Salem, Or., March 5.—Governor Benson issued a proclamation this afternoon calling the legislature in special session at 10 o'clock Monday morning, March 15th, for the purpose of passing the appropriation bill which failed at the regular session because of a defect in the proceedings.

In a statement to the press, Governor Benson says that a majority of the members have voluntarily promised that no new legislation will be taken up but he indicates that there may be a number of minor defects in acts of regular session which will need correction at the special session. In this, he evidently has reference to the game code, the tax commission law and some minor bills in which defects have been found.

Call Is Made Specific.

In his proclamation calling the special session, Governor Benson announces that the session is "for the purpose of enacting Senate Bill No. 254, introduced at the 25th regular session of the legislative assembly of 1909, and upon which bill final action was inadvertently not taken, being act entitled 'An act to appropriate money for the expenses of the improvements, equipments, betterments, supplies, repairs and other necessary expenses at the Oregon state insane asylum, state penitentiary, state reform school, Oregon institution for the blind, state institution for feeble minded and the Oregon soldiers' home.'"

Mr. Benson said in an interview:

"Besides the appropriation bill in question there may be a number of minor mistakes and omissions in other bills that will need correction. These matters can be attended to in a very short space of time. I have not attempted to exact pledges of any nature from the members of the legislature, but have received voluntary assurance from a majority of the senators and representatives that no new legislation will be considered, and that both houses will attend to the business which has called them together and adjourn. Several of the members have volunteered to serve without pay, and as there will be little or no expense in the matter of clerk hire, printing, etc., the cost of the session to the taxpayers will not be a heavy one."

HOW TO DO BIG THINGS.

Ever stop and watch the erection of a modern steel building?

How slowly it is assembled!

The chain is loosed. The whistle blows. The derrick and chain are lowered again, and the process is repeated. Day after day, hour after hour, the work goes on. The whistle blows, the little engine feels the clutch that calls for higher speed and more power, and slowly, but surely, the steel beams are hoisted to their places.

The building is going together—the only way it can be put together—piece by piece, a little at a time.

First there was a plan.

An architect made the plan. In the beginning the plan was in his mind. He made a rough draft. Then his assistants worked out every feature elaborately in blue prints. The building must follow the plan.

So is every great task performed.

But, mind you—

Not only the COMPLETED work is seen in advance, but the PROCESS by which the work is completed; not only the WHOLE is seen, but the PARTS. If the builder could see nothing but the completed building he would be appalled at the prospect. But he sees it as a combination of details. He can do this big thing only by doing many little things, and he can do them.

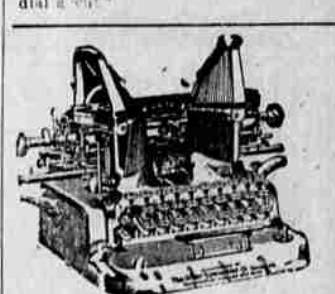
