AN UNWISE MOVEMENT

The Guard regrets that the talk of moving the capital from Salem is taking definite shape and is likely to come up for a vote of the people at the next general election. It is not that the people of Lane county have any reason to feel that they owe Salem anything but a grudge, when they reflect on the large majority cast against the University appropriation last year, but rather because there is no particular reason to aid a wrong movement just to "even up" and old score.

The state of Oregon has reached a stage in its growth and development where we should begin to have settled conditions and permanent institutions. Salem people should be encouraged to invest their money in permanent improvements that will make it in time a capital city that all Oregonians will be proud of, just as Eugene is endeavoring to become a university city that will rank with any in the country. Corvallis is doing similar work because of the big school there, and Roseburg is proud of her Soldiers' Home. This distribution of state patronage is right and proper, and in due course of time should extend to Eastern Oregon when the inevitable branch asylum and penitentiary are made necessary by growing population. Also there will be established, probably by the next legislature, one strong central normal school, possibly two, which should not be located in Portland.

Portland has a commercial importance that should be sufficient reason for her citizens declining to accept any of these institutions even if they are proffered. Let them remain in the smaller cities, or be located therein as new institutions are required, since after all every other town in the state must pay a large tribute in trade to the state's metropolis.

The people of Salem will probably expect the voters of Eugene to cast their ballot in favor of the state capital remaining at its present location. Let's see—what was the majority Marion county rolled up in favor of the State University appropriation?

While the head of the Rockefeller clan is doing some figuring in American court laws, the younger members are making their bows to the royal court of Great Britain. Meanwhile the oil consumers pay the freight both ways.

Mayor Tom Johnson, of Cleveland, must be thinking of evening up some old legal scores, for he is studying law. He may be a little old for a student, but he has brains and energy, and they always count more than years.

"THIS IS MY 51st BIRTHDAY."

Ruggiero Leoncavallo, the famous composer, was born in Naples, March 8, 1858. As a youth he dreamed of a military career, but abandoned his plans in this direction to take up the study of music. He went to France, where his lack of funds caused him many hardships. In the midst of his struggles to make a living by doing such odd musical jobs as he could find, he wrote a poem called "Medici." Fortunately for his future, he got an opportunity to read his lines to Massenet, who advised him to go to Milan and read them to Ricordi. M. Ricordi commissioned Leoncavallo to write music for the poem. The work was completed in a year, but the young composer had a long and weary wait for the initial production of his great effort. Meantime he took up teaching again to keep from starving. Then he decided not to wait any longer for the production of "Medici," but to try to write something that would be produced at once. That was how he came to produce "I Pagliacci" in five months. On May 17, 1892, it was produced for the first time, and the next morning Leoncavallo was famous.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

Bismarck, N. D., has adopted the commission plan of city government.

Ex-Senator Fulton may be appointed federal judge for the new district recently created in Oregon.

The state legislature of Washington has passed a bill providing for an election in November, 1910, to decide whether women shall be allowed to vote.

Nathan Straus is reported to have declined a tentative offer of the majority nomination in New York made to him by the more potent leaders of Tammany Hall.

Ex-Governor Dawson of West Virginia, whose term of office expired March 4, is to be appointed to gather manufacturing statistics for the United States government in China and Japan. For fifteen years Mr. Dawson has been the recognized head of the Republican organization in West Virginia.

It seems to be pretty well settled that President Taft is to visit the Pacific coast late this summer. The immediate purpose of the trip will be to visit the Seattle exposition. According to the tentative arrangements, the trip will occupy the last week of July, all of August and part of September.

Richard A. Ballinger, the new secretary of the interior, was brought up on a Kansas ranch and for a time was a cowboy. He studied while riding his pony and made long journeys to receive every week Latin lessons to a learned steward of Fort Larned. A minister who lived near his father's ranch taught him Greek. He completed his education at Williams College.
