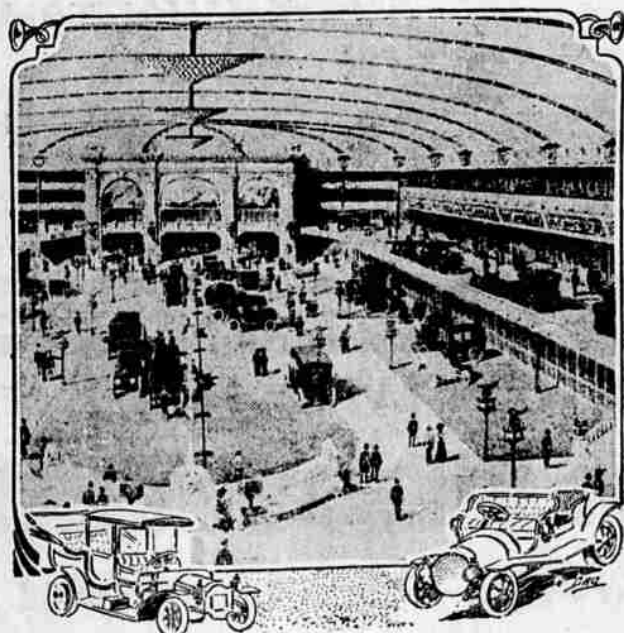

LICENSE LEAGUE TO HOLD COAST CONVENTION

Louisville, Ky., March 8.—The Na-
tional Model License League, with
its main offices in Louisville, Ky.,

and with a big membership among
the wholesale and retail liquor
trades and distillery and brewery in-
terests of the country, has announced
that it will hold a convention in San
Francisco the latter part of next May
to organize the coast trade to work
for the enactment of the proposed
"model license" law in the several
states.

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
