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PEACH ORCHARDS UNHURT BY COLD

Severe Weather in January Was Not Harmful, Says Secretary Williamson

Although there has been considerable said regarding the damage to the peach crop of Oregon by the severe weather of January, the yield will be fully up to the average, according to Secretary H. M. Williamson, of the State Board of Horticulture.

"I am sure very few peach trees were winter killed this year," Mr. Williamson says, "and from reports received from various peach-growing localities I should judge that growers who predicted a failure of the peach crop were more scared than hurt. It is natural to expect peach trees to die in seasons of extreme cold, but the peach trees of the state have never been killed in the winter, and we have only the past to go by in predicting the future."

The principal peach-growing districts in the state are The Dalles and Ashland, and reports from these sections are to the effect that little or no damage has been done to peaches or any other fruit. The Willamette valley does not grow many peaches at best, but the trees heard from in that section are all considered unhurt and capable of bearing the average yield.

"Oregon has never been an exporter of peaches, and a light crop would therefore be better for the growers, though of course worse for the consumer. A surplus would mean cheap prices, as it would not pay to export in less quantities than a carload, and a heavy yield would mean a large portion of the fruit left unsold."

BLACK EYE FOR DRAIN RAILROAD

Southern Pacific Preparing to Ship Away Cement Supplies

Traveling men who reached Marshfield from drain yesterday state that Warren Reed of Gardiner informed them that the Southern Pacific has made arrangements to remove the several thousand barrels of cement that were shipped to points along the Umpqua when the Drain-Coos Bay line was started a few years ago. It is stated that vessels will shortly come and take the material away, presumably to Tillamook to be used on the new line there.

There have been rumors at various times of the proposed removal of this material but this is the first time that any definite information has been received.

HARRIMAN WANTS ONLY REAL MONEY

Marshfield, Or., March 10.—A definite answer regarding the matter of building the Drain-Coos Bay line by E. H. Harriman has been received. When a committee visited Mr. Harriman last fall the members understood the railway magnate to say that he would build the road if it was shown that the business would pay four per cent on the investment. Colonel Holabird, a representative of Harriman, visited Coos Bay and was furnished statistics as to shipments from this point and the decision of Harriman has been anxiously awaited.

A telegram from Harriman to Governor Chamberlain indicated that Harriman was expecting a money guarantee of four per cent from Coos Bay before he would build the road. The Chamber of Commerce of North Bend and Marshfield telegraphed Harriman asking that the matter be made more clear, as the conditions were not understood that way. In response to this telegram Harriman has wired to Dr. McCormack, president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, a definite answer as follows:

San Blas, Mexico, March 10.—Dr. J. L. McCormack, Marshfield, Oregon: You are misinformed as to Colonel Holabird's report. My offer to your delegation last August was very plain, and if satisfactory guarantee can be had of 4 per cent on the cost of maintenance, operation and taxes, I will recommend its construction to our committee. No one's opinion will be satisfactory. Guarantee must be on a basis that deficit in any one year will be immediately paid and the guarantee properly secured.
