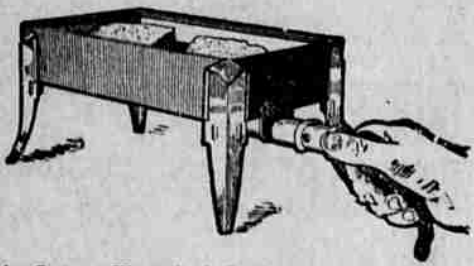

CHAMPION WESTON

PLANS LONG WALK

Seventy-Year-Old Pedestrian
Will Tramp From New
York to Frisco

New York, March 13.—Edward Payson Weston, the famous pedestrian, will be seventy years old Monday and he plans to signalize the anniversary by starting on a walk from this city to San Francisco. The feat will be undertaken in fulfillment of a promise made 30 years ago when Mr. Weston won the Astley belt with a record of 550 miles

in 142 hours. The famous pedestrian told Sir John Astley then that he would be in condition on his seventieth birthday to begin a task which would excel his previous feats. Mr. Weston expects to complete his walk across the continent in 100 days. The distance, as he estimates, is about 4,000 miles. He will travel through Troy, Albany, Utica, Syracuse, Rochester, Buffalo, Pittsburgh, Columbus, Toledo, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Yellowstone Park, Tacoma, Portland, Oakland, San Jose and San Francisco. Following the custom of his life, the veteran pedestrian and record breaker will not walk on Sundays, but will take the seventh day for rest. He intends to deliver lectures at points on the road.

Weston has been a recognized factor in pedestrianism since 1861, at

which time he walked from Boston to Washington to witness the inauguration of President Lincoln. He traversed the distance of 453 miles in 208 hours. In 1867 he made his first long-distance walk from Portland, Me., to Chicago, starting Oct. 29 and arriving at his destination Nov. 28. Two years ago, when sixty-eight years of age, he eclipsed his previous record by covering the distance between Portland and Chicago in 24 days and 19 hours. In the late seventies many remarkable feats of pedestrianism. His world-wide recognition came in 1879, June 31, when he covered the remarkable distance of 550 miles in six days. This was in London and his only competitor was "Blower" Brown, who had a record of 542 miles.

When 54 years of age—Dec. 18, 1893—Weston undertook the walk from New York City to Albany, a distance of 143 miles, starting at 9 o'clock Monday evening and calculating to reach his destination Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. Great interest was taken in this endeavor and thousands of people gathered along the way to see him. He arrived at the capital in Albany more than 11 hours ahead of his schedule, was returned by train to this city and gave a testimonial in Chickering Hall.

NEWS FROM LABOR WORLD

The workmen's compensation act is to be reintroduced in the Manitoba legislature.

Canadian mine workers are discussing affiliation with the Western Federation of Miners.

The Trades and Labor Council of London, Canada, will open a toy factory to employ men out of work.

The annual convention of the Glass Bottle Blowers' Association will be held in Milwaukee from July 5 to 25 of this year.

The International Master Painters and Decorators' association at its convention at Baltimore voted to hold its 1910 convention in Detroit.

Statistics show that the accident liability of the brakemen of the United States is considerably greater than that of the brakemen in any other country.

The women operators of the trunk telegraph department of the general postoffice at Leeds, England, have recently organized a union for their own protection.

Starting with a membership of more than one hundred, the Tailors and Cleaners' Protective Association of Cincinnati and vicinity was organized at a recent meeting.

Statistics collected by the government and extending over a period of six years, show that 1,000,000 deaths of males, nine per cent were due to accidents while following their vocations.

The various locals of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees are at present voting by referendum on a proposition recently made, to publish, at the expense of the organization an official organ.

The labor laws of France for the protection of women and children only extend at present to those employed in the various industries and manufactures, but not to those employed in commercial establishments.

During the six months from April to September 1908 the total membership in the various labor unions of the state of New York showed a decrease from 288,582 to 272,458, which amounts to a loss of 26,122 members.

All the locals of the Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paper Hangers of America will be called upon during the coming month of June to determine whether there shall be a general assembly this year. There has been none since 1905.

A movement is under way for the organization of a pipe trades council in Minneapolis, Minn. A special

committee of four has recently been appointed by the Plumbers' and Steamfitters' unions, and similar committees will be appointed by the other interested organizations.

A novel decision affecting labor unions was handed down by Justice Mills in the supreme court in White Plains, N. Y. He held that labor organizations which picket a factory and thereby put the owner to expense for guards for his property and employes must pay for such expense and the men directly concerned by giving and taking pecuniary support and assisting in unlawful acts of the pickets.
