## NORMAL SCHOOLS IN FIGHTING MOOD

Will Attempt to Force Appropriation Through During Special Session

To inject the normal school fight into the special session of the legislature called by Governor Benson for Monday is the object of a meeting which is to be held in the Chamber of Commerce tomorrow. The normal school brigade is determined to make another attack notwithstanding the general opinion that the work of the legislature should be confined to remedying the errors of the enrolling committee, and that the session should meet and adjourn Monday, says the Oregonian.

Between 20 and 30 business men of Ashland are to come to Portland tomorrow to discuss the normal school question. Several members of the legislature, who also are friendly to the normals have also

recognition, there is also a disposition on the part of anti-normal members of the legislature to keep the bill on. The legislature will find that the governor's office wishes the business confined to correcting a few errors. There is no indication on the part of Governor Benson to send in the vetoes, although there are members who want to take them up. If the votes are sent in there is no telling when the special session will adjourn. Of course, there will be attempts to introduce new legislation in addition to the normal fight, which is sure to come.

It is now a question of whether there are enough anti-normal members to hold the others at bay. While the anti-normal crowd controlled the situation in the closing hours of the recent regular session, some may not continue to stand pat now, especially if by joining issue with the normal boosters they can bring support for vetoes, should Benson be induced to send them in.

The Salem board of trade has passed resolutions asking the legislature to make provision for the normals at least until the people of the state can decide whether there shall be one, two or three normals or none. E. V. Carter, of Ashland, now in Portland working in the interests of the normals, is taking the lead in the fight. He has written a letter to a Salem acquaintance saying the people of his section are very bitter on account of the manner in which the normals were turned down. He writes further that there will be a delegation of Ashland business men at the statehouse Monday to use their best efforts to have the normals given a fair hearing.

## PETITIONS AGAINST THE O. A. C. APPROPRIATION

Big Amounts Voted for Corvallis School Will Be Held Up for Two Years

Salem, Or., March 13.—That a desperate effort will be made to hold up the appropriation of \$210,000 for improvements and new buildings at the Oregon Agricultural College is shown by the statement of E. D. Briggs, Ashland attorney and normal-school booster, who stated while here today that a referendum petition is being circulated in the southern part of the state, and has already received 2500 signatures in Jackson county alone.

Briggs states that the petition is being very generally signed and that the required number of signatures no doubt will be secured.

sure a vantage point from which to bring pressure to bear on the friends of O. A. C. in the scheme to reopen the normal school fight. As only 65 per cent of the electors are required to refer the appropriation there seems to be no doubt of the success of the movement to hold up the appropriation, if those behind it are in earnest.

Briggs, who was in the legislature several years ago, was a member of a Southern Oregon party of boosters on their way to Portland to bring pressure to bear on the Multnomah delegation to secure support for the reopening of the normal school fight.

Ashland Starts Move. From Ashland it is learned that two referendum petitions have been forwarded to Attorney-General Crawford asking his opinion as to the correctness of form of the petition. Accompanying each petition forwarded to solicitors and circulators is a slip containing information as to the manner of securing and attesting the names signed and requesting that the petitions be forwarded to "Drawer J. Ashland, Or."

The appropriation bill for improvement at the State Agricultural College is separate from the continuous appropriation for maintenance. The special appropriation, totalling \$210,000, are divided as follows: Thirty-five thousand dollars for new armory, \$55,000 for central agricultural building, \$35,000 for a new heating plant, \$30,000 for purchase of additional land at Corvallis, \$5,000 for construction of new greenhouses and \$50,000 for additional equipment not itemized in the bill.

Nothing has as yet been learned as to the whereabouts of Charles Stauffer, manager of the Riddle Mercantile company, a general merchandise concern at Riddle, who left that city last Saturday. 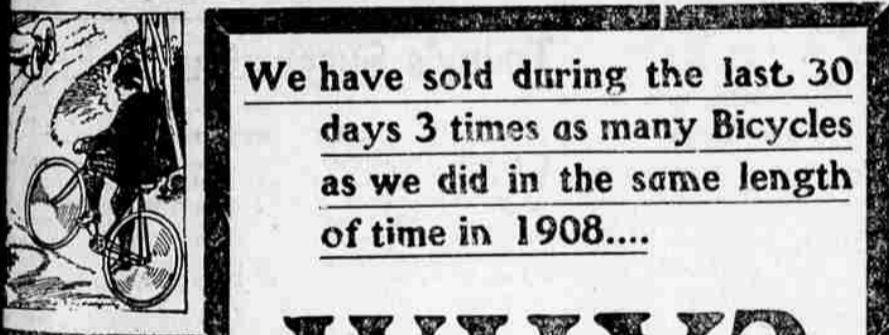
