PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

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So many small and independent condensaries have sprung up during the past two years that they are proving a menace to the big concerns and the work of absorbing the little fellows has started. It is stated that one of the big concerns has already taken up two of the small plants; not openly, to be sure; but under the management of the big one. Old brands are still continued in the plants purchased, but it is stated that the buyers are gradually "killing" off the independent brands in one way or another. Just how many plants have been quietly absorbed, recently cannot be told and the work of absorption is still going on.

For this reason there is practically no fighting for business in the canned milk trade as was witnessed a short time ago—or before rumor said the independents had been taken under the protecting wing of the larger and older as well as better established corporations. The canned milk business is growing very fast until today the product is no longer considered a luxury, but a necessity.

Knocking Coast Hops.
The following telegram was received yesterday by Kaber, Wolf & Netter from a New York correspondent:

"The ways and means committee will not increase the tariff on imported hops. American brewers everywhere are knocking all kinds of Pacific Coast hops. Imports since February 1 have been increasing heavily and exports are decreasing."

An effort was made in the winter by Herman Kluber and other hop men to induce the ways and means committee to double the duty on foreign hops, and Congressman Fairchild, of New York, recently made the same plea before the committee. It was pointed out that imports of German and Austrian hops have vastly increased in the last few years and that the hop-growing industry in this country was threatened with ruin. As a remedy they asked for a duty of 24 cents a pound on imports. This, according to the above telegram, will not be granted.

The Oregon hop market continues dull and most dealers class it as weak. There is some demand for last year's crop, but buyers yesterday were not offering over 7 cents. It is not likely that business can be worked at this figure. Only about 4000 bales are left unsold in the state and they are in strong hands.

Apples in London.
W. Dennis & Sons, fruit brokers of London, in their latest report on the apple trade, say:

"We are pleased to confirm our last week's mail to the effect that a slight improvement was showing itself in the apple business. This has been realized during our sales this week."

"Barrel stock has been in better demand and for box fruit with any show of quality higher figures have ruled, prices being as follows:

"California Newtons, 4-tier, 7s to 7s 6d; 8-tier, 6s 1-2c to 6s 1-2c; Oregon Newtons, 4-tier, 12s 1-2c to 14s; 8-tier, 8s 1-2c to 9s per box.
"Nova Scotia Baldwins, 21¢ to 22¢ per barrel; Russets, 16¢ to 17s 6d per barrel; Starks, 17¢ to 18s per barrel; Fallwaters, 16¢ to 20s per barrel; Bea Davis, 14¢ to 16s per barrel."

Wheat Market—Quiet.
The local wheat market was quiet yesterday and the feeling was inclined to be somewhat easier, but the prices quoted were generally unchanged. For club wheat \$1.07 changed. It was said that some could be bought at \$1.08, but holders asked \$1.10. For red Russian \$1.06 was offered and \$1.07 to \$1.08 asked by holders.

Oats sold at \$29.50, the highest price reported paid this season. There was good inquiry for barley around \$30.50.

Egg Market Is Steady.
Locally the egg market was steady today and the price held at former quotations. Most sales during the day were around 21c although a shade or two above or below this figure. Receipts yesterday were not great as great as expected and practically all that came were cleaned up at once.

Chicken market remains in a very good position with prices unchanged.

Idaho Sugar Is Advanced 10c.
Sugar prices in Southern Idaho have been advanced 10c per hundred pounds by Pacific coast refiners, owing to the great strength in the competing eastern markets. While no change in prices is noted in Oregon, California, Washington or northern Idaho, all interests are still talking of a rise to come. The difference

between coast prices and those ruling in southern Idaho has been reduced to 15c, this being close to where the figures should be at all times. Therefore the trade is inclined to the opinion that the next advance in the east will affect Pacific coast values.

Cheese Prices Advancing.
The arrival of the steamer Sue Elmore from Tillamook did not furnish the market here with much more cheese and therefore the tone of the trade is still very firm. Cause of the continued scarcity of supplies, some sellers are today quoting an advance of 1-2c a pound on all grades over former quotations.

Creamery butter market is holding very firm to steady with supplies but slightly increased and still scarcely able to take care of the current demand.

Cabbage Market to Advance.
Cabbage prices here are firmer because of the higher prices in effect all through California. While the quotations are way up in the air demand is well able to take care of all that comes.

A car of mixed vegetables, including cabbage, cauliflower, asparagus and other varieties, was reported in this morning from the south.

Onions Moving Out Steadily.
"The Oregon onion crop is now being moved at the rate of about two cars a day," said a dealer today, "and there is not the slightest reason for any fear that there will be any stocks of consequence left in the hands of growers when past first offerings of Texas and California bermudas reach this market."

We look for a complete clean-up long before the Southern onions put in an appearance, at prices around \$1.00 the growers generally show a disposition to sell.

Mohair Sales Are Reported.
Several sales of 1909 clip of mohair are reported by the local buyers around 22¢ to 24¢ a pound. The market is not disposed to show much excitement at the moment owing to the earliness of the season. A year ago the price of mohair in small lots opened around 20c a pound but later dropped back to 18¢ to 19c.

Portland Livestock Market.
Portland Union Stockyards, March 17.—The entire livestock market shows a good tone today. Receipts in all lines were small and for this reason prices held very well.

Cattle are growing firmer with top steers ready moving at \$5.00, although but little of this class is coming forward just now. The big buyers are taking everything that comes and are paying as high as \$4.35 for top cows. However, at this price, the quality must be strictly first class.

The trade in general is awaiting the arrival of spring lambs out to buying for future delivery is thus far reported.
