MAYOR HOUSTON PRESENTS HIS SIDE OF CASE

Explains Circumstances of Recall From His Point of View

Junction City, Or., March 18.—Mayor C. P. Houston, against whom a recall petition was recently circulated, makes explanation of the circumstances, from his point of view, in the following statement:

"I wish to set right the public in reference to the proposition of recall of myself as mayor of this place. The recall petition was circulated and there were nearly as many signatures as there were votes against me when I was elected, and I got the highest vote of any one running, and I will say I believe the good people understood what they were doing at the time.

"The matter of controversy was not individual, but was the decree of the circuit court, and was also ordered by the city council, so that I, as mayor, should enforce the law. Through a conspiracy worked up by the lawless element which broke me up in business twice, rendering me helpless to liquidate my debts, my opponents have taken advantage of my condition, so I have everything to gain and nothing to lose but my life.

"The recall petition was brought up in the council, and Councilman Miller, who championed the petition, moved to lay the petition upon the table until the next regular meeting in April. To this I objected, demanding immediate and decisive action, and producing the opinions of Judge W. S. McFadden, concurred in by District Attorney E. R. Bryson.

So large an attendance is expected at the banquet that diners will be confined to Yale men entirely, who will not be able to secure seats for outside guests. It will be the first had to entertain a fellow-alumnus who is president of the United States. President Taft was graduated in the class of 1878, and a number of his classmates will be at the dinner.
