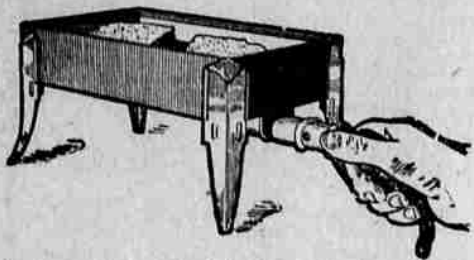

POITICAL BEES

STING SENATORS

**Oregon Lawmakers Have All
State Jobs Already
Staked Out**

Political bees buzzed industriously
in the state senate during the special
session, and few members escaped
being stung, says the Portland Tele-
gram. All the state offices are cov-
eted by senators, and everything in
sight was spoken for.

For governor Senator Jay Bower-
man, Senator Albert Abraham and
Senator Ben Selling were mentioned.
Bowerman says he has not made up
his mind; Abraham says he would
just as soon enter the race, and as
regards Selling, while it is suspected
he would like to be governor, he is
also discussed as a possible candidate
for mayor of Portland.

For secretary of state Senator J.
B. Coffey has entered the lists, and
Senator Ike Bingham wants it. While
awaiting this place, however, Bingham
is devoting all his time to running
as candidate for mayor of Eugene.

For state treasurer Senator Tom
Kay has laid his plans, and he ap-
pears to have a monopoly just now.

Kellaher, material for mayor of

Portland.

Selling, receptive candidate for

mayor of Portland; material for gov-

ernor.

Sinnot, material for congressman

in second district.

Beach, for state printer.

Bowerman, looking for governor-

ship.

MILLIONS AT STAKE

IN OIL CASES

**Suit to Dissolve Standard Oil
Company of New Jersey
Begins Tuesday**

St. Louis, Mo., March 20.—Follow-
ing months spent in the taking of
testimony, argument in the govern-
ment's suit to dissolve the Standard
Oil Company of New Jersey is fixed
to begin next Thursday in the United
States circuit court in this city. The
judges who will hear the argument
are William Van Devanter, Walter H.
Sanborn, Elmer B. Adams, and Wil-
liam C. Hook. In the event of a
disagreement between these jurists
the case will be certified up to the
supreme court. In any event the
case will not be tried by the ap-
pellate division, as it has been arranged
that in the event of a decision either
way the case will be appealed direct
to the supreme court.

The government's case against the
Standard of New Jersey was filed in
this city in December, 1906, and
the taking of testimony began the
following year. The government
presented 190 witnesses and the
Standard Oil Company 140. The
suit is said to be the most expensive
ever brought by the government of
the United States, and it is esti-
mated that it will cost the govern-
ment \$5,000,000 and perhaps more
before it is finally decided by the
supreme court of the United States.
The heaviest item of expense has
been the counsel fees, which it is
estimated will run up into millions
of dollars.
