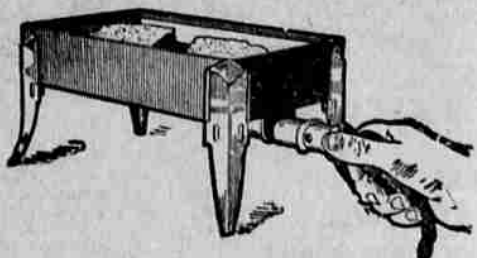

WILL G. STEELE TALKS OF PROPOSED ROAD TO CRATER LAKE

In Addition to \$100,000 Appropriated by Legislature,
\$150,000 More in Sight

Will G. Steele, of Portland, who addressed the students at the University of Oregon assembly today, was seen by a reporter at the Hoffman House this morning. He seemed pleased over the action of the legislature in appropriating \$100,000 for the building of a good wagon road to Crater Lake, Oregon's great natural wonder. Besides this sum, Jackson and Klamath counties each have promised \$50,000, and Mr. Steele says he expects that E. H. Harriman, the railroad magnate, will give \$50,000, making a splendid sum for this work.

Jackson county already has started preliminary surveys for the road, said Mr. Steele, and it is expected that some construction work will be done this summer, although the bulk of the work will not be done till a year from now. In places where the grades are almost prohibitive, the new surveys around such hills give a grade of only two per cent.

Mr. Steele has been conducting a stopping place at the rim of the crater for the past two summers, and hopes to be able to build a good hotel there in the near future, so that sight-seers and tourists may have all the comforts of a first-class summer resort during their stay there.

6000 EGGS HATCHING AT BIG POULTRY FARM

Salem, Or., March 22.—The greatest chicken ranch in Oregon began to yield returns at the Krebs' hop farm near Waconda, on the Oregon Electric today, when the first batch of chickens was hatched by incubators. There are now 6000 chickens in process of incubation, and due for hatching in a few days.

This is the ranch in which E. R. Brown, of Eugene, owns one-third interest, having recently moved his chickens from Eugene to that place.

NO KNOWN MOTIVE FOR SUICIDE OF EMIL CALANCHINI

Modesto, Cal., Paper Tells of
Arrival of Body There
From Cottage Grove

The Modesto, Cal., Herald of March 19 contains the following in regard to the suicide of Emil Calanchini, whose body was found in the city park at Cottage Grove a few weeks ago.

The body of Emil Calanchini, the Swiss dairyman who committed suicide at Cottage Grove, Oregon, some weeks ago, arrived here yesterday and the funeral will be held this morning from St. Stanislaus Catholic church at 11 o'clock. Interment will be in the Catholic cemetery.

Calanchini left Modesto on February 10th on an annual trip which he has been in the habit of taking, and it is stated by relatives that he had over \$1000 in his possession when he left this city. He went first to Oakland, where he remained some days and then proceeded north.

According to reports received from Cottage Grove he left the train there and going to the park cut his throat with a pocket knife. The sum of \$101.90 was found in his pockets, but there was nothing in his clothes, but would lead to his identity, everything evidently having been destroyed before the man left the train. Even the initials in his hat band were destroyed, the only thing overlooked being the name of the firm of D. and G. D. Plato, the local clothiers, in his coat. This finally led to his identification.

The only cause that can be assigned for the man's suicide is ill health, one of his relatives stating that a local physician had told him that death might overtake him at any time owing to a weak heart. Other than this he was not known to have anything to worry him. He left no family other than two brothers, one residing here and the other at Modesto.

As has been stated heretofore, the deceased resided in this vicinity for many years, having been employed on a number of nearby dairy ranches. He is spoken of very highly by his former employers. It has been his habit for some time to take a month's trip annually, visiting different sections of the West.
