HARVARD, YALE AND PRINCETON IN ONE DEBATE

Princeton, N. J., March 26.—A lively interest is manifested in college circles in the triangular debate tonight between the representatives of Harvard, Yale and Princeton Universities. The question which will be discussed by all three institutions is, "Resolved, That all corporations engaging in interstate commerce should take out a Federal charter."

Harvard has the affirmative and Princeton the negative at Cambridge, and Princeton the affirmative and Yale the negative at New Haven.

Milwaukee, Wis., March 26.—Delegations from Chicago and other cities are here for the debate at the Hippodrome tonight between Mayor Rose, of Milwaukee, and President Samuel Dickie, of Albion College. Mayor Rose will support the negative side of the question, "Resolved, That prohibition as applied to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages is right." Three debates have been arranged. The second of the series will be held in Chicago and the third in a Southern city.

ENGLISH WOMEN

**BEGAN SUFFRAGE
CAMPAIGN TODAY**

London, March 26.—In Queen's Hall this evening the foes of the woman suffrage movement rallied in force and fired the opening guns in a campaign that is planned to put the "votes for women" advocates to rout. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Woman's National Anti-Suffrage League, an organization quietly formed some time ago, but of which much will probably be heard from now on.

Mrs. Humphrey Ward occupied the chair and Austen Chamberlain, Sir Edward Clarke and several other notables were among the speakers. Miss Bentley, the secretary of the league, aroused enthusiasm by reporting that nearly one hundred branches had already been organized and that others were in process of organization in cities and towns throughout the United Kingdom.

CASTRO LEAVES FOR VENEZUELA

Paris, March 26.—Cipriano Castro, the ex-president of Venezuela, accompanied by his wife and a corps of servants and attaches, sailed from Bordeaux today on the stamer Guadalupe, bound for Venezuelan and West Indian ports. It is understood to be the intention of the ex-president to disembark at Port au Prince and there await further advice as to the condition of affairs in Venezuela before venturing to proceed home.
