NEW SENSATION IN CALHOUN CASE

**Five Trusted Employees in De-
fective Force Turn
Traitor**

San Francisco, March 28.—Five
men, two of them trusted employees
of Detective Burns and District At-
torney Langdon, were arrested yester-
day charged with robbing the of-
fice of Langdon to secure evidence in
favor of Patrick Calhoun, now on
trial on the charge of bribing a su-
pervisor. The other three are alleged
to be employees of the United Rail-
roads.

The arrested men are: Rex N.
Hamlin, confidential employee of Dis-
trict Attorney Langdon; Al McKin-
ley, United Railroads and Roel ge-
between; I. E. Platt, secretary of A.
Z. Elberbach, employed in the dis-
trict attorney's office to investigate
jurors; William Corbin, go-between
for Abe Roel, and Jerry Van Wor-
mer, United Railroads detective.

Hamlin, who was first arrested,
made a complete confession and the
other arrests followed.

For a long period Hamlin has been
a trusted employee of Langdon and
Burns, and was the only man in the
office who had a key to Burns' desk
and possessed the combination to the
safe.

Traitor at \$200 a Month

About December 1 Calhoun's
agents succeeded in secretly winning
Hamlin over to their side. Since
then he has been on the United Rail-
roads' payroll at a salary of \$200 a
month, and it has been his practice
to transcribe the confidential records
and all documents which he thought
would be of importance, turning
them over to McKinley, who in turn
submitted them to the inspection of
his superiors.

About two months ago Burns be-
came aware of Hamlin's broken trust
and has kept close watch on him.
Hamlin has been permitted to han-
dle nothing of moment.

He was not arrested until yester-
day, so that ample incriminating evi-
dence might be collected against
those who hired him.

When arrested Hamlin was copy-
ing an affidavit for delivery to agents
of the United Railroads.

Platt, it is charged, sold reports of
the investigations regarding members
of the jury panel, to John Helms, of
the Calhoun detective agency.

All the prisoners have been placed
in separate cells in the city prison.
