FAMOUS CARDINAL IS SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS OLD

Rose From Humble Station to Important Church Position

Rome, March 29.—Cardinal Giraldo Maria Gotti, prefect of the propaganda and undeniably one of the ablest as well as one of the most famous members of the Sacred College, was seventy-five years old today. Beyond receiving the casual congratulations of some of his ecclesiastical colleagues, the eminent cardinal, whom nine out of every ten well-informed Catholics believed would be the successor of Pope Leo XIII, allowed the seventy-fifth anniversary of his birth to pass unnoticed, for he still adheres to the austere life prescribed for the Carmelite order of monks to which he belongs.

The origin of this extraordinary man was an extremely humble one. His family belonged to the lowest social strata of Italy. The elder Gotti was a dock laborer, with little learning and no ambition. The son, however, disclosed a phenomenal devotion to religion, and at the age of 14 he entered the Barefoot Carmelite order, and soon proved so apt a scholar that he was soon transferred to the house of the order in Rome. Little by little he rose from one post to another, always making an advance with every new change, until he became superior of the mother house of the society and was finally chosen superior general.

While he was in this position of power the pope sent him to Brazil, where he showed administrative ability of the highest order. He spent three years in Brazil and succeeded in his mission to reorganize the church there. Upon his return to Rome he was created a cardinal. Since then his ability as a diplomat has been evidenced on more than one occasion. His knowledge of canon law is asserted by many to be superior to that of any other member of the Sacred College. He is a distinguished orator, and speaks French with perfection, and Latin with as much grace as did the late Pope Leo XIII.

In his private life Cardinal Gotti is very modest. He lives in a palace overlooking the forum of Trajan, but he is still the barefoot monk, at least in spirit. His sleeping apartment is furnished like that in which he slept during the years when he was an ascetic and student, and he uses no display save that which is positively imposed upon him by the rules regulating the life of a cardinal.

STATE FAIR STAKES \$22,000

Two Purses of \$500 Each, and \$1000 for Consolation Race

Twenty-two thousand dollars in purses have been hung up by the Oregon state fair commission for the race meet to be held during the fair September 13 to 15, inclusive. The schedule calling for the purses was adopted at the meeting of the commission at Salem Tuesday.

There are two big purses of \$5,000 each. They are the Greater Oregon and Lewis and Clark purses, and it is expected that large fields will enter both races. The main race will be for \$4,000, with a consolation race for the other \$1,000 to all non-winning starters, providing there are no less than eight starters in each of these races.

COAST LEAGUE HAS OPENED

Portland Starts With Series at Los Angeles Today.

All indications point to an aggressive and well contested campaign of the Pacific Coast League of baseball clubs, the opening games being scheduled for tomorrow. Sacramento and Vernon have been added to the circuit of last year, which comprised Los Angeles, San Francisco, Oakland and Portland.

The opening games scheduled are: Oakland at San Francisco, Vernon at Sacramento and Portland at Los Angeles. The season will consist of 200 games and will close the last of October.

Cleveland, March 30.—Forty-two years old and one of the greatest pitchers in baseball is the remarkable record of "Cy" Young, who is to wear a Cleveland uniform this season after an interval of eleven years spent with the Boston club of the American League. Young was born in Gilmore, O., March 29, 1867, and has been playing major league ball since 1890.

For Autoists
Any one who has piloted a windowed launch or car in the rain agrees that seeing any distance ahead—owing to the raindrops sticking to the glass, is a difficult task.

To obviate the difficulty, wipe off the moisture and then rub the outside of the glass with a piece of cloth soaked in glycerine. Young Newman, who cleared 5 feet 9 inches in the high jump Friday night, is the best man in his event that the University has had for several years. Every week he walks to his grandfather's, who lives near Creswell, and the weekly jaunt has been good training.

C. Mac Show, a University tennis player, has been elected manager of tennis during the spring by the University athletic council.

Dean T. Goodman has been chosen football manager; to succeed Trainer Hayward, by the University athletic council. "Pete" Whitley did not want the job. He was assistant manager last fall, and appeared to be the logical candidate. Goodman, however, is a man of proved ability, and his appointment is considered eminently satisfactory.

King, the famous catcher of the Chicago Cubs, will not play ball this year. Manager Chance says he hates to have him go, but he doesn't complain bitter.

O. A. C. has lost Davolt, one of the best distance men produced in the Northwest; Lounsbury, who was an all-around man of rare ability; Swan, whose pole-vaulting made him a dangerous competitor; and Greenhaw, an exceptional quarter-mile runner. The boys at Monroe have organized what is known as the Monroe baseball club and elected officers. The members are all out soliciting and it is expected that they will get a large membership. The club will get new uniforms and other necessary things and after a few weeks' practice they will be ready to accept or challenge the other clubs of this vicinity.

O. A. C. is experimenting on having graduate coaching for baseball. Captain Otto Moore, though not a graduate, is doing very well as coach. He keeps posted on all the intricacies in the sport, and under his direction the men are turning out well.

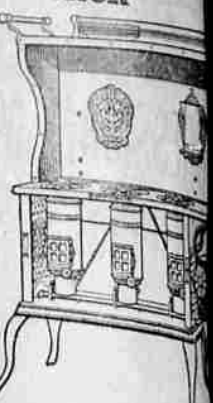
