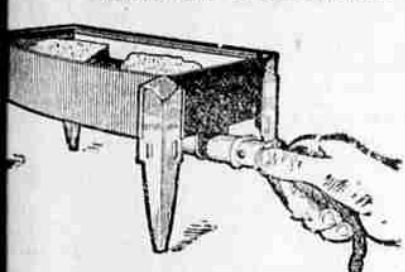

DEATH OF MR. AND MRS. F. W. A. CRAIN

Passing of Two Former Eugene Pioneers at Pasadena, California

The very sudden death of Mrs. Melissa Crain on the 18th inst., at her home in Pasadena, Cal., marks the passing of another noble citizen who for many years was identified with Eugene's activities. She survived her husband but six months, and of him a brief sketch in this connection will be of interest.

F. W. A. Crain was born at Geneva, New York, November 5, 1827. In October, 1853, he was married to Mary Melissa Lowell, in Harrah, Wis. During his early years he was a minister of the M. E. church, but becoming a cripple he devoted most of his time to his trade, that of a jeweler and watchmaker.

Coming to Eugene in the early 70s, he established the leading jewelry store in the city, it being located in the old Masonic hall, which stood on the northwest corner of Eighth and Willamette streets, now occupied by the Hovey block. Later he changed his location to the Marx building. A few years ago he moved to Junction City, where he continued in business up to two years ago, when on account of impaired health he went to Pasadena, Cal., where he greatly enjoyed his remaining days. His death occurred in that city on September 7, 1908.

Mr. Crain was always a close student, and took an active part in whatever his condition permitted, often filling various pulpits during his residence in Eugene. He was always held in very high esteem. During the greater part of his business career in Eugene he was associated with his brother, Horace N. Crain, now of Prairie City.

Mrs. Mary Melissa Crain was born in Cleveland, Ohio, September 23, 1837. At the age of sixteen she was married to Mr. Crain, and for more than fifty-five years was his constant companion and helpmate, until death called him. But the separation was indeed brief, for after a little over six months she, too, was called to be with him. Both died happy in the Christian faith, in which they had found so much joy and consolation throughout life.

They leave an adopted daughter, Anna D. Crain, who for many years taught in the Eugene schools, and who now is the assistant principal of one of the large schools of Pasadena, L. C. HULIN, Los Angeles, Cal., March 27, 1909.

WOMEN'S CLUB PASSES RESOLUTION ON HAZING

Investigation of the hazing of Ralph Bristol, the Portland boy who was driven insane by the treatment accorded him at the University of Oregon, will be begun by the committee appointed by the regents within a short time, says the Portland Journal. Judge William Smith, of Baker City, one member of the committee, has stated that he will be able to come to Portland to begin the work of investigation about April 1.

In this line the educational department of the Portland Woman's Club at its last meeting adopted resolutions condemning the practice of hazing and calling upon the faculty to put an end to it. The resolutions follow:

"To the Faculty of the State University, Eugene: Realizing that the matter of hazing is becoming of frequent occurrence in the school and knowing that the results are exceedingly detrimental to the health and humiliating to the spirits of the students, we, the members of the educational department of the Women's Club of Portland, Or., seriously and bitterly deplore such a condition of affairs, and fully believe that the remedy lies in your hands."
