

KILLED AND SEVERAL WOUNDED IN RIOT BETWEEN OFFICERS AND COAL MINERS

April 1.—A riot occurred this afternoon at Cheswick town above this city. The officers shot and killed one miner and others are reported seriously injured. A number of miners were arrested. His number several hundred, attempted to rescue the shooting followed. After the shooting the miners' efforts to get hold of their companion, finally they had started on their way back to the mines, two and a half miles from Cheswick. The miners are in an ugly mood, and at 4 o'clock a force of county detectives left this city in an automobile.

TE CONVICTS ARE RECAPTURED

San Francisco, April 1.—Michael Alexander G. Hagan, a convict who escaped from San Francisco Monday, was recaptured today as they were about to board the river steamer, Mocha. They had stowed themselves in the hold of the vessel and were discovered by the crew.

MEXICAN TAX COLLECTOR KILLED

El Paso, April 1.—What was first declared to be a revolt of Indians at San Andres, Mexico, against the payment of taxes on cattle, is now described as a riot resulting from the clash of political factions. In the fight, a tax collector was killed and several deputies wounded.

Washington, April 1.—Speaker Cannon, after a conference with President Taft today, was asked when he thought the house would vote on the tariff bill. "God knows," he replied. He added that no vote would be taken until after an opportunity for due deliberation has been given.

Only Tariff Business

The senate adopted Hale's resolution to confine the business of the extra session to the consideration of the tariff question, to the exclusion of everything else, except the bill making appropriations for the thirtieth census.

HARRIMAN WILL CONTEST DECISION

Portland, Or., March 31.—The Harriman lines will, according to W. W. Cotton, general attorney for the O. R. & N. Co., contest in the courts the recent decision of the interstate commerce commission in the case commonly known as the "Spokane rate case," on the ground that the Harriman lines are compelled to carry freight a much longer distance in order to deliver it at Spokane from eastern points than are the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads.

CRAZY SNAKE REMAINS IN HIDING

Pierce, Okla., March 31.—Reports that Chittl Harjo (Crazy Snake) is hiding in Tiger mountains about six miles from here have been confirmed. His surrender is expected within 24 hours. A messenger which came in from the chief said Crazy Snake was wounded and would surrender if promised fair treatment, but the messenger did not give the location of the camp and the chief has not been found. The chief will be guaranteed a fair trial.

M'KENZIE POWER PLANT SITE MOST SUITABLE THAT CITY COULD POSSIBLY HAVE GOT

McKENZIE POWER SITE IS ENDORSED

Eugene, March 31st.—We, the undersigned, citizens and taxpayers of Eugene, Oregon, have made a personal inspection and very complete inquiry into the city power site at Walterville on the McKenzie river, and find the same to be an excellent site for an intake and tail race power plant, and that we believe the cost of construction will be very reasonable, as a great part of the upper end is a natural canal and the rest is over practically level, clear land, which is easily dug. We think that it would be a very profitable investment to the city and will furnish power for all purposes, that the city may need, until the population shall reach 20,000 people.

the abutting property. He thought the canal would be a benefit to all concerned. C. E. Potter, on whose land the canal will begin, has lived there for the past 24 years. He saw no occasion for fear that the canal would become a new channel for the river; that the canal would enhance the value of abutting property as it would act as a sub-irrigant. If the intake was ripped it would greatly add to the stability of that part of the structure. Mr. Potter said that in 1881 the water covered the road a few inches, but this was caused by the water in the river backing up in a small creek flowing through his place. John Fountain, a resident on the bank of the canal for the past 37 years, and there could not possibly be danger from the canal. He also reiterated what Mr. Potter said regarding the backing up of water in the creek so as to overflow the road. William Valley Company in its report stated that the canal would be a benefit to the settlers as well as to the city. He was not afraid of the canal overflowing, and besides the construction of the power plant would give work to all those desiring it. TWELVE SAILORS DIE IN EXPLOSION

Oil Tank Bark Blows Up While Undergoing Inspection

Marseilles, April 1.—The French tank bark, Jules Henry, in the oil trade between Philadelphia and Cetta blew up today, and is practically a total wreck. Twelve of the crew were killed and many wounded. Great sheets of fire followed the explosion. The prompt aid of nearby ships was given, but it was impossible for small boats to get near the burning vessel. Six burned and mutilated bodies were recovered, and a number of bodies are missing. The boat was being inspected at the time of the explosion.

MILITARY PRISON AT LEAVENWORTH PARTIALLY BURNED

Leavenworth, Kas., April 1.—The military prison at Fort Leavenworth was partially destroyed by fire early this morning (Thursday). The prisoners were removed from the cell houses under heavy guard of United States troops and confined in the stockades. None of the prisoners escaped. It is believed. The fire gained great headway because of low pressure of water. There was great excitement among the prisoners who feared they would be burned to death. The soldiers with leveled rifles met the convicts as they came out. Guards were under instructions to shoot at any sign of trouble. The display of weapons effectively awed the prisoners. The loss is \$200,000. There were 800 prisoners and at 2 o'clock the cell houses were cooled sufficiently to allow half of the prisoners to return.

New York, April 1.—Jack Johnson, a heavyweight pugilist, was convicted today of a crime against Almeda Douglas, a seventeen year old negro, and a fine of \$200 was imposed.
