Allen for the first time when he made his speech of acceptance in the convention hall at Duluth, running for mayor on the gas and water company ticket. And since I have known him here in Eugene he has always been a municipal ownership man. But to my surprise I find he is now working for the opposition party and against the municipal ownership people. I suppose he still remembers how badly he was beaten for mayor by Henry Truelson, who with eight aldermen out of thirteen elected

put the municipal ownership plant to working in Duluth. The gas and water company in that city had oppressed the consumers until they revolted, and also stunted their English bondholders out of \$500,000. Since the installation of the municipal plant in that city water rents have been reduced and the plan has proved a great success.
