day that gentleman desired the com-

at Waltherville had.

Canal Site Excellent

The contention that the site of the
canal will be overflowed each year
is disproved by the fact that in 1891
Mr. Post built a rail fence on his bot-
tom land. Since that time Mr. Post
has not seen the fence but a few
times. Yesterday the committee vis-
ited the fence and found that it stood
as firmly as the day it was finished;
not a rail displaced, not even the fallen
leaves and brush washed as would
have been in case had an overflow
occurred.

On the east and adjoining Mr.
Post's land is the ranch of George W.
Irvin. While Mr. Irvin is compara-
tively a newcomer in that section,
still he is thoroughly conversant
with conditions existing there. His
land is bottom, and since living there
no water has covered any portion of
his farm except a small bridge over
where the canal will cut through. The
bridge is in a low place, and once
since Mr. Irvin's residence there has
it been covered with water to a
depth of two feet. Mr. Irvin said
that the overflow at that time was
caused by water being backed up in
the draw by flood trash. He has so
much faith in conditions there that
he has lately constructed a large
modern house on this land and only
raised it four inches above the level
of his old house. He thinks the con-
struction of the canal will be of ben-
efit to all concerned.

Some comment was made regard-
ing the statement of Mr. Stephen
Smeed, agent the article appearing
in the Register to the effect that
in the Register to the effect that
water had covered the farm of Oscar
Millican, in which event Mr. Smeed's
house would have been completely
covered with water, and in which
Mr. Smeed denied as being true.

Mr. Post told us that the statement
of Mr. Smeed was absolutely true,
that if the Register's article had been
true, then the water would neces-
sarily have been 20 feet above Post's
barn, which is the highest structure
in Waltherville.

Splendid Site for Plant.

Another thing found yesterday
which throws discredit upon the con-

sarily expended before the tail race
to the power plant would be available
for use. As the river ran in 1903,
it made a swerve to the north, since
that time it has straightened its
course and where the old channel
was, now exists a slough. The site
of the power house will not be ex-
ceeded 80 rods from the old channel
and the water from the tail race will
be diverted into this slough and low-
er down enter the river. The maps
and profiles of surveys show this to
be a fact.

To the Editor:—Our ignorance may
lead us to say something that we
should not have said, but because of the
lack of a word or two of explanation
in Tuesday morning's Register we are

deal. Mr. Bingham says in his plat-
form: "Ineffective laws shall be re-
placed by new ordinances, etc., not
saying what the ineffective laws are,
but merely a strict enforcement of the
"blind pig" law.

To local prohibitionists, that looks
like pure water standing on top of bat-
termilk—please don't shake it.
Why will the people vote for Mat-
lock? Because he is independent of all
corporations, and stands on a plat-
form that is run by the corporation and big fel-
lows, so, therefore, we think it would
not be polite in him if he did not serve
them if elected. The Register says the
McKenzie Valley Irrigation Com-
pany is a little thing, and don't amount
to much. All corporations were bap-
tized once, but when fed on milk and
honey by little cities like Eugene, have
grown until they became elephants,
