POWER PLANT ISSUE DODGED BY BINGHAM

Courts Have Not Decided Yet; After That I Will Decide My Course."

I. H. Bingham, candidate for mayor of the second city in Oregon, succeeded in dodging the main issue of the present campaign in his speech at Dempster's hall last night to the full satisfaction of two-thirds of the voters in the audience.

Bingham said that he did not have to tell what he would do with the McKenzie power plant proposition. With one of his all-including genial smiles, he said courts had not decided on the injunction suits yet, and that he and his associates, if elected, will consider the best interests of the city of Eugene when the courts do their part.

But the candidate did make one definite promise. He stated that when the people of Eugene vote for a municipal electric plant, he will give them light, if they will only elect him. One man claims that Bingham stated that such action would be accomplished under his direction in thirty days, after the people had spoken.

When the candidate had ended, S. D. Allen, gave a talk. With the utmost certainty he said that \$14,000, perhaps, \$15,000 has been squandered by the city council.

Simon Klov Dahl, though a strong anti-power plant man, denied a statement of Mr. Allen's emphatically. He said the sum was not over \$6,000. Klov Dahl then attacked Engineer Kelsey and thought the council either fools or knaves.

At the meeting there were about sixty voters present.

A count showed them to be two-thirds solid for Matlock and municipal ownership candidates. All the vociferous applause given the speakers came from a dozen Bingham supporters.

A lunch was served following the address, furnished by the candidates from Otto's grill. This part of the program was excellent.

PERILOUS TRIP OF ZEPPELIN'S AIRSHIP TODAY

Driven Before Strong Wind and Unable to Make Landing

Munich, April 1.—Zeppelin's airship, which ascended this morning from Friedrichshafen with the intention of landing here in the presence of the Prince Regent and entire garrison of Munich, is the plaything of the winds and is sailing uncontrolled before a high wind in a northerly direction. The wind is too high to attempt a landing, and fast automobiles are in pursuit. The airship is manned by Count Zeppelin, Major Sperling and several officers of the engineer's corps from the balloon battalion of the German army.

Finally Lands Safe. Dingolfing, April 1.—The airship landed safely this afternoon, after being eleven hours in the air. Part of the time the circumstances of the journey were perilous. The rear motor refused to work and the forward motor alone could not develop sufficient strength to drive the airship against the high wind. Several anxious hours were spent before an opportunity offered to make a safe landing.

WHITE FOUND NOT GUILTY AND WILL GO AHEAD WITH STABLE

Jury in Police Court Finds That Building Ordinance Is Not Violated

The trial of Cliff White, charged with violating the city's building ordinance in beginning the erection of a feed stable within the fire limits, was held this forenoon in the police court before Judge Morris and a jury consisting of the following: A. A. Aaby, David Link, A. S. Powers, C. H. Hales, E. C. Lake and J. D. McDonald.

C. A. Hardy appeared as counsel for White and Attorney Paul Merrill appeared as private prosecutor. After the hearing of the testimony the jury retired and in a short time returned a verdict of not guilty.

White some time ago secured a permit to build his stable on the Rosevelt lot at East Ninth and Pearl streets. Soon after the work of preparing the ground for the building was begun the council extended the fire limits to cover that lot and White was ordered to cease work. He quit until Tuesday, when he began again. He was placed under arrest with the result as aforesaid.

There is some talk of enjoining White from proceeding further with the building on the ground that it will be a nuisance.
