BERG LOSES TO DR. ROLLER

Difference in Weight 24 Pounds, But
51 Minutes Taken for First Fall

Dr. Benjamin F. Roller, the Seattle
heavyweight wrestler, made his first
appearance in Portland before a
crowded house at the Exposition Rink
last night and defeated John Berg in
a very fast catch-as-catch-can grap-
pling match. Dr. Roller took both
falls, the first in 51 minutes and the
second in four minutes and four seconds.
The first fall was secured by the use of a head-
scissors, or the locking of both legs
around Berg's head, and the second
by a body-scissors, together with an
arm-lock.

Berg weighed 178 pounds and Dr.
Roller 202 pounds. Nevertheless Berg
took the offensive at first, and it was
only after Roller had him tired out
that he could win.

NAKED GREEK ATHLETES

Plato Tells How Athenian Men Com-
peted in Events

University track athletes have
been compelled to keep off the cam-
pus paths in going to and from the
athletic field. The action was taken
on the ground of conventionality, for
the arms, shoulders and sometimes
the calves and knees are bare.

The following from an article in
the Popular Science Monthly has
been presented by a member of the
University faculty:

"It would be no small shock to the
public sentiment if our athletes in
winning public races were to strip
themselves stark naked, yet that cus-
tom was rather suddenly introduced
into Greece. Plato says (Republic
V, par. 452, Jewett's translation):

"Not long ago the Greeks were
of the opinion, which is still gener-
ally received among barbarians, that
the sight of a naked man was ridi-
culous and improper, and when first
the Cretans and the Lacedaemonians
introduced naked exercises the wits
of the day might have ridiculed them."

SUMMARY OF GAME LAWS

Legislature Made Changes and Rem-
edied Defects

The following summary of the
game laws enacted by the 1909 leg-
islature has been prepared:

Back deer—Except in Baker,
Grant, Harney, Malheur, Clatsop,
Columbia and Wallowa, the open season
extends from August 1 to November
1. In the counties named it extends
from September 15 to November 1.

Silver-strut quail—Open season
extends from October 1 to January 1.
Chinese quail—Except in Jackson-
ville, Hood River and
Malheur, open season extends from
October 15 to November 15. In the
counties named there is no open sea-
son.

CAPITOL GRAFT

CASES ARE ON

Third of Series of Trials Opens
At Harrisburg Next
Monday

Harrisburg, Pa., April 3.—The
third of the series of trials growing
out of the scandal surrounding the
contracts for the State Capitol fur-
nishings will be started in the Dauphin
county court Monday. The de-
fendants include Joseph M. Huston
of Philadelphia, the architect of the
capitol; James H. Shumaker of
Johnstown, who was superintendent
of the board of public grounds and
buildings during the period of the
furnishing of the building; and Wil-
liam P. Snyder of Spring City, for-
mer auditor of the state. Another
of the defendants, John H. Sand-
erson of Philadelphia, the contractor
for the furnishings and decorations,
has applied for a separate trial on
the ground that the condition of his
health is such that to be placed on
trial at the present time would en-
danger his life.

The case to be tried is on which
charges conspiracy to defraud the
state out of \$25,577 in a bill for
\$61,940 for desks supplied to the
state. All the defendants, with the
exception of Architect Huston, were
tried last spring, convicted and sen-
tenced to two years each in the pen-
itentiary. They appealed and were
granted new trials.

Several other defendants, of whom
there were fourteen in all, remain to
be tried. Since the indictments
were returned two of the defendants
have died and one or two others have
broken down physically or mentally
under the strain.

The capitol scandal is one of the
outcomes of the political revolution
in Philadelphia in 1905, following
which a Democratic state treasurer
was elected. He discovered and made
public alleged irregularities and the
prosecutions followed.
