SITE IS SOLD

A big deal was consummated in this city this week involving the Latham sawmill site, including the mill and machine shops and other buildings, dams, yards and sidetracks, covering something like 33 acres of land at the Latham siding of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, one mile south of Cottage Grove, the consideration being \$10,000. A. Woodward, the sawmill man, who has had this property leased for the past few years from the Pacific Timber Company, was the purchaser, he having built up a large timber trade since he has been operating and enlarging the mill. He recently installed a large new planer in his mill and is now able to deliver both rough and dressed lumber of various grades.—Cottage Grove Leader.

CREAMERY TO BE ESTABLISHED AT FLORENCE SOON

Hazlewood Cream Company, of Portland, to Build Plant

Information was received a few days ago from the Hazlewood Cream Company that they were preparing to ship a creamery outfit to the Steamer. The company has made contracts with the dairymen in this vicinity to purchase their cream, and it will be made into butter here. Instead of being shipped to Portland, as was done last year, the contracts are made for a term of three years.

The directors of the McLeod school district have decided not to have their new schoolhouse built till the latter part of the summer. They will have the lot cleared off and will probably let a contract in a short time for a building to be erected early in the fall.

POSTMASTER PAGE WILL GET SALARY INCREASE

For the fiscal year ending March 31, the increase in postal receipts at the Eugene postoffice over those of the year previous was \$5299.40, which is much more than enough to insure an advance of \$100 in the salary of Postmaster Page. He is now getting \$2600 a year and this showing will put him in the \$2700 class.

By quarters during the past year the receipts of the office from the sale of stamps were as follows: First, \$2644.84; second, \$5491.94; third, \$7183.51; fourth, \$7487.48; total, \$26,807.78. Total for previous year, \$21,408.38. Increase last year over previous year, \$5499.40.

LUMBERMEN ARE GETTING EXCITED

Say There Is No Truth in the Report That Lumber Has Slumped

Portland, April 3.—The Columbia and Willamette river lumber manufacturers and loggers are considerably wrought up over the report that has appeared in a number of newspapers on the Pacific coast stating that the bottom had dropped out of the lumber market in the Northwest. Prominent men in the lumber business state absolutely that there was no reason for the publication of such a report; that there was no reason for loggers to reduce prices on the present output of the logging camps, and that there being no surplus and with the cost of labor and stumpage advancing, a reduction at this time is out of the question. What will happen if the tariff on lumber is greatly reduced is problematical, but some timbermen maintain that unless the tariff is maintained it will result in a reduction in both the cost of stumpage and the cost of labor.

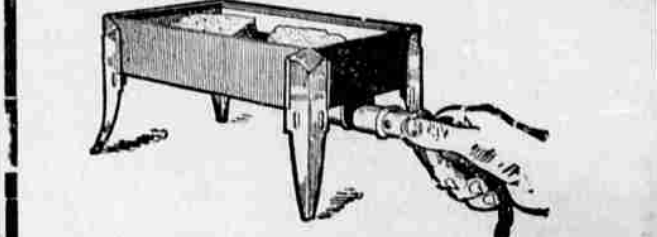
